## Message from the Provost for Biomedical Research

This volume containing the published outcome of our faculty members' broad-ranging scholarly and research productivity in 2019 has an unexpectedly strong resonance with me and my fellow authors. That is because as this work goes to press, we still find ourselves in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, which has had a profound impact on all aspects of our academic enterprise and its end results. Essentially, most research and publication activities took steep downturns in 2020 as our community responded to the health crisis with facilities shutdowns and our faculty had to pivot their attention to revamping their teaching into virtual instruction modes. Therefore, our publications in 2019 will be a critical placeholder for our achievements until we regain our momentum—as, undoubtedly, we will.

Clearly, not only has the Touro College and University System been affected by the coronavirus—colleges across the country have been similarly affected since we all seek not just to generate new knowledge, but to share that knowledge through publications. While the peer review process evaluates what appears in the scientific literature, it is important to remember that what we publish becomes accessible to the public and is a projection of our scholarship standards within the academic community. - Unpublished technical reports & working papers
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- Items that have the following description: “in press”, “forthcoming”, “corrected proofs” or any other kind of publications that are not yet published with sufficient metadata exposed.



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
