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

DR. THOMAS J. KIRWIN



The Board of Trustees of the New York Medical College and Dr. J. A. W. Hetrick, President and Dean of the College, announce that Dr. Thomas J. Kirwin, now Assistant Director of the James Buchanan Brady Foundation for Urology, New York Hospital, has been appointed Professor of Urology at New York Medical College and Director of the Department of Urology in Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospital and Metropolitan Hospital.

Dr. Kirwin, who will assume his new duties this month, holds degrees from the universities of Michigan, Tulane, Cornell, Columbia, and Yale and has attended the University of Wisconsin and the Sorbonne. He is a fellow of the American College of Surgeons, the International College of Surgeons, and the New York Academy of Medicine. He is a member of the American Urological Society, the American Medical Association, and the New York County and New York State Medical Societies, and is certified by the American Board of Urology. Dr. Kirwin is also a member of Delta Tau Delta, Nu Sigma Nu, and Sigma Xi.

He has written for the *Oxford Loose-Leaf Surgery* chapters upon operative and non-operative

treatment of the kidney and for the *Cyclopedia of Medicine* chapters upon diseases and surgery of the ureters. Many original contributions to medical journals here and abroad have been made by Dr. Kirwin. He is also joint author, with Dr. Oswald S. Lowsley, of a standard textbook of his specialty, *Clinical Urology*, and of a widely-used manual, *Urology for Nurses*. These books have been translated into Spanish and Portuguese and have a large circulation in South American medical centers. Dr. Kirwin has lectured extensively throughout the United States.

Moreover, he is the inventor of several instruments for use in urologic surgery, including a cystoscopic rongeur, a rotary resectoscope, and a "boilable" cystoscope, the first ever to be devised.

This appointment of Dr. Kirwin emphasizes the steadily growing importance of New York Medical College among the medical schools of the country. The college has a chair of urology with a full directorship and full professorship that are independent of the chair of surgery.

DEAN HETRICK VISITS WALTER REED HOSPITAL

Upon invitation of the Secretary of the Army, Dean J. A. W. Hetrick visited and surveyed the educational program of the Army Medical Center, Walter Reed Hospital, Washington, D. C.

The visit included a survey of the Center's educational activities, rounds in the Hospital, and conferences with members of the instructional group as well as other officers. A luncheon was arranged to which the nine students from the New York Medical College serving clinical clerkships in the Walter Reed Hospital were invited as well as other guests. The survey was conducted under the general direction of Major General George Armstrong, Deputy Surgeon General, Colonel Floyd L. Wergeland, and Major General Paul H. Streit, commanding the Army Medical Center.

The survey occupied the better part of two days, and the evening of the first day Dr. and Mrs. Hetrick were guests of Colonel and Mrs. Wergeland at the latter's home. The following night, Major General and Mrs. Armstrong, Colonel and Mrs. Wergeland and Colonel and Mrs. Gould were guests of Dr. and Mrs. Hetrick at the Shoreham's Terrace Room.

ADMINISTRATIVE ANNOUNCEMENTS

Dean J. A. W. Hetrick of the New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals, announces a bequest of \$500,000. to be used as a special endowment for the division of Surgery in the Medical College and Hospitals. The Valentine Professorship of Surgery has been established, and Dr. James M. Winfield, Professor of Surgery and Director of the Department of Surgery has been named to that Professorship. The bequest was made through the generosity of the late Eliza and Samuel Valentine.

The charter of the New York Medical College has been amended upon recommendation of the Board of Regents of the State of New York so that in addition to the degrees of Doctor of Medicine, Master of Medical Science and Doctor of Medical Science, Bachelor of Science degrees in specified fields may be granted to qualified students, and honorary degrees of Doctor of Science and Doctor of Humane Letters may be conferred by the College.

Another bequest of \$240,000. from the late William Nelson Cromwell is announced.

New quarters for the Departments of Obstetrics and Gynecology, and Graduate Surgery, have been created on the main floor of the Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals.

The Morrisania City Hospital became an affiliate of the Medical College last Spring, and the Seton Hospital has just entered the group of College affiliates.

This year fourth year medical students will be assigned to the Memorial Hospital for Clinical clerkships under the general direction of Dr. Allen O. Whipple.

Tuition to the Medical College has been increased to \$725. per annum.

Dr. Francis D. Speer has been appointed Professor of Pathology and Clinical Pathology, and Director of the Department to succeed Dr. George K. Higgins, resigned.

A new department, the Department of Physiology and Pharmacology, has been established under the direction of Dr. James W. Benjamin. Dr. Benjamin's appointment is that of Professor of Functional Anatomy and Director of the Department of Physiology and Pharmacology.

The Bird S. Coler (2,000 bed) Memorial Hospital, in the process of erection by the Department of Hospitals of the City of New York, has been assigned to the New York Medical College as a teaching unit by Commissioner Marcus D. Kogel.

New quarters consisting of a suite of five rooms, newly equipped, in the Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals have been completed through the generosity of an anonymous donor.

The Children's Center, administered by the Department of Welfare of the City of New York, has been affiliated with the Department of Pediatrics of the Medical College.

A Scopicon for use in the Department of Pathology of the Medical College has been presented by an anonymous donor.

Dr. Lawrence J. Slobody has been appointed Professor of Pediatrics and Director of the Department of Pediatrics to succeed Dr. Reuel A. Benson.

Dr. Benson continues his association with the College as Professor of Graduate Pediatrics.

Dr. Milton J. Wilson has been appointed Director-in-Committee of the Department of Orthopedic Surgery, to fill the vacancy created by the death of Dr. Anson H. Bingham.

Colonel Harold E. Glascock, Jr., has been appointed Professor of Military Science and Tactics and Administrative Intern at the Medical College.

Dean Hetrick reports that the Medical College has received some forty odd grants from United States Public Health Service, United States Army, United States Navy, New York Heart Association, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Milbank Memorial, Wakefield Foundation, Rosenstock Memorial Foundation, American Medical Association, a large number of pharmaceutical and drug houses, and several individual donors—to a total of approximately \$225,000.

J. to Altadena, Calif., to take up our residence here, I at once set out by plane to several Central and South American Countries to visit mission fields. Returned in six weeks, arriving in California the second week in February, 1949. Have remained at our new address, 1744 No. Craig Ave., Altadena, Calif. ever since, and am busily occupied every day, and all day. Fruit, flowers, food, recreation, and real results, helping thousands of boys from 15 to 30 years of age to get properly adjusted to their environment. The work of Chaplain in the largest county jail in the world is an inspiration difficult to equal.

Always glad to receive the Chironian. My former friends, and the College, are still very close to me. Walter Nichols, '03, (Pasadena, Calif.) and I have met several times. Walter is retiring from active medical practice in favor of his M. D. son, who is a fine young and promising doctor, and very well accepted in and about Pasadena."

Dr. and Mrs. John S. Gaines 2nd, hospitalized at Flower-Fifth Avenue since June 26th, due to severe right pelvic hip injuries suffered in an automobile collision, returned home September 12th and September 30th, respectively. Both are still recuperating and progressing in their recovery, but are still greatly incapacitated and under nursing care. They desire to thank all Friends for the generous "Fan Mail" and expressions of good wishes sent them.

A FANTASTIC REPORT

During August while hospitalized, Dr. Gaines received a small legacy (about \$50.00) from Culpeper Va. Court from the estate of William Strother

Wallis, (who lived about 1730 to 1780) six generations and 200 years ago during Colonial days, both of legal interest and quite a fantastic story.

IN MEMORIAM

She compiles the data necessary for studying the etiology and epidemiology of a particular malady, information regarding its fatality, geographic concurrence, and the age, sex, race and other conditions of life most affected. The Public Health Department determines its future course of action by the trend of such information; the government depends upon medical record statistics in population research, housing program, social security plans, national defense and international status".

The profession of medical record librarian is still new, so this is your opportunity to choose a "Career" where horizons are unlimited in scope.

Requirements of the medical record librarian—a high school education; English and biology are essential and some Latin is helpful.

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
