
College Supporters Gather in Tarrytown at Annual Founder's Dinner

William Campbell, Ph.D., Longtime, Celebrated NYMC Adjunct Professor, Wins Nobel



Outside the entrance to the World Health Organization headquarters in Geneva is a sculpture of a boy leading a blind man with a stick. Doris Bucher, Ph.D., associate professor of microbiology and immunology, says the sculpture pays homage to all the work that went into the near eradication of onchocerciasis or "river

blindness." Yet, when she looks at it, she feels particular praise for the former colleague whom she credits with wiping out the disease -- the celebrated NYMC adjunct professor and lecturer, and now 2015 Nobel Prize winner, William Campbell, Ph.D. "I was so touched," Dr. Bucher, says of the first time she saw the sculpture. "When I saw it I thought, 'this is what Bill did." Read more...

New York Medical College Seeds Selected for the Flu Vaccine



Once again NYMC flu vaccine seeds developed in the laboratory of Doris L. Bucher, Ph.D., associate professor of microbiology and immunology, have been selected for the flu vaccine composition. The selections were announced at the WHO Consultation and Information

Meeting on the Composition of Influenza Virus Vaccines for the Southern Hemisphere 2016 held in Memphis, September 21-23. Twice a year WHO organizes consultations with an advisory group of experts to analyze influenza virus surveillance data and issue recommendations on the composition of the influenza vaccines for the following influenza season. The periodic replacement of viruses contained in influenza vaccines is necessary in order for the vaccines to be effective due to the constant evolving nature of influenza viruses. Every year since 2004 one or more of the high-

yield reassortant vaccine NYMC seeds developed in Dr. Bucher's lab have been used internationally for the preparation of the vaccine formulation for both the northern and southern hemispheres, approximately 400 to 500 million doses annually.

New York Medical College Achieves Top ACCME Accreditation



The Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) recently awarded the School of Medicine the coveted status of "Accreditation with Commendation" and extended its accreditation for an additional two years through November 2020 for a total cycle of six years. This is the highest possible rating that a sponsoring institution can achieve as a provider of continuing medical education

(CME). According to ACCME policy, the commendation status is "reserved for programs which are truly exceptional." Only a minority of CME providers obtain commendation and this is the first time that NYMC has gained this distinction. ACCME cited NYMC as, "a learning organization and a change agent for the physicians served," which demonstrates "an engagement with the environment in support of physician learning and change that is a part of a system for quality improvement." Five rare antique brass microscopes awarded in the late 1800s to top students at NY Homeopathic Medical College (NYHMC), the predecessor to New York Medical College, have returned home to the College after as much as 138 years.


Public Health Program Passes the Test . . . with Flying Colors



The School of Health Sciences and Practice's (SHSP) public health program recently earned the maximum term of accreditation—seven years--by the Council for Education on Public Health (CEPH). With the delivery of a final interim report in May 2016, the SHSP public health program is accredited through July 1, 2022. The national accreditation process is intensely rigorous to ensure that

schools and programs of public health are effectively preparing their students for impactful careers in the field and that they are all guided by the same broad mission of public health -- defined by CEPH in 1978 as "enhancing health in human populations, through organized community effort." **Read more...**

Reverend Monsignor James P. Cassidy, Ph.D., who served as chancellor of New York Medical College from 1987 to 1992 died on October 14 at the age of 90. He became a member of the NYMC Board of Trustees in 1972 when he was the director of the Department of Health and Hospitals Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of New York with responsibility for 17 Catholic hospitals and home care agencies. He also served for many years as the second vice chairman and secretary of the

D.P.T. Class of 2015 Achieves 100 Percent First-Time Passing Rate on the National Licensure Exam



For the second year in a row, graduates of the NYMC Doctor of Physical Therapy program have achieved a 100 percent first-time passing rate on the national licensure exam. The Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy administers the National Physical

Therapy Examination (NPTE), the examination that every graduate of a physical therapy education program must pass to become a licensed physical therapist in the U.S. "Our graduates have traditionally been in the mid- to high-90 percent range on their first attempt, notably above both state and national averages. However, in the last two years we have achieved a 100 percent first-time passing rate-the beginning of a new tradition of which we are very

proud," said Michael J. Majsak, P.T., Ed.D., associate professor and chairman of the Department of Physical Therapy. "I congratulate our students and our faculty and staff who work diligently to empower our students for this level of success. These sort of achievements are truly a collaborative process."




