Dear Members of the New York Medical College (NYMC) Community:

We are now well into the spring semester with our first- and secondyear students back on campus and our third- and fourth-year students at their clerkships and electives across our many clinical affiliates. It is a particularly busy time for our fourth-year students as Match Day approaches on March 18, when students will learn where they will continue their training in their chosen area of specialty. Early match results have already come in for some our students, including our military matches and matches in ophthalmology and in urology, where we had one of the highest matches in the country—with seven students matching in urology this year.

Last month, we received the good news that the Accreditation Council

for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) granted NYMC continued accreditation and commended us for demonstrating substantial compliance with the ACGME's Institutional Requirements with no citations. This is another example of the recognition of the quality of medical education offered here at NYMC and why the School of Medicine (SOM) remains a top choice for prospective medical students with applications once again totaling more than 12,000 to date as we continue to conduct medical student applicant interviews.

We continue to work to enhance our research mission and provide our students with more opportunities to conduct research. This month, we welcomed <u>Chioma Okeoma, Ph.D</u>., as the vice chair of research for the Department of Pathology, Microbiology and Immunology, who brings years of experience as an award-winning interdisciplinary scientist to NYMC's research program. Given her extensive research background, we are confident that Dr. Okeoma will be a great asset in enabling us to continue to advance our research program.

I am also pleased to share that Fawaz Al-Mufti, M.D., associate professor of neurology, neurosurgery and radiology, has accepted the new role of assistant dean for graduate medical education research. Dr. Al-Mufti will help us to further clinical and translational research opportunities for residents and fellows at NYMC-sponsored graduate medical education programs, in concert with the College's designated institutional official (DIO). This is an important step that will help us to advance our research footprint and capacity at NYMC clinical affiliate sites.

We are now in the final stages of our search for a new DIO and I look forward to sharing news of this important appointment. In addition, the search for a new chair of the Department of Surgery will officially begin soon. A search firm has been identified and a search committee has been established, which will be led by Peter Panzica, M.D., chair of the Department of Anesthesiology at NYMC and director of anesthesiology at Westchester Medical Center (WMC).

As COVID-19 cases continue to decrease, we are hopeful of opportunities to have more events in person, though New York Governor Kathy Hochul has not yet made any announcements specific to colleges and universities. In the interim, we will continue adherence to the safety guidelines in place that have been so effective in keeping our NYMC community safe throughout this pandemic. I look forward to a time when we can resume our normal operations and fully come together in person as a community. Thank you for all your efforts to keep the campus safe and to further the important mission of the NYMC

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Impact of War on Medicine Subject of New Elective

"War has been a driving factor for the evolution of medicine throughout human history. From the development of basic hygiene to our advanced trauma protocols, the military has driven our need for advanced medical innovation," said Mill Etienne, M.D. '02, M.P.H., vice chancellor for diversity and inclusion, SOM associate dean of student affairs and associate professor of neurology and of medicine.

As a captain in the U.S. Navy Reserves, it was Dr. Etienne's firsthand experience in the U.S. military that inspired the creation of a new elective course at NYMC on the impact of war on medicine. Although many of the world's militaries have played a role in



medical development, the class focuses on the U.S. military and the pivotal role it has played in the advancement of medicine from the American Revolution to the recent conflicts in the Middle East, as well as the direction military medicine needs to go based on current and possible future threats.

Ryan Fahey, M.D. '21, a captain in the U.S. Army, now doing his surgery residency at San Antonio Military Medical Center, worked with Dr. Etienne on planning out the course. "During my first few years at NYMC, I kept seeing names of various physicians and surgeons whom I found had their medical roots in the military," said Dr. Fahey. "I realized that military medicine played a large role in the development of modern medicine, and I thought that our heritage needed to be passed down and remembered."

"The amazing thing about this course is that it relates to every field that the students are going into from psychiatry (shell shock to post-traumatic stress disorder) to emergency medicine (tourniquets) to radiology, surgery, primary care, obstetrics and ethics. Every student reflected on how military history had meaning in their chosen field," said Lisa Hirsch, M.D., clinical assistant of medicine and of family and community medicine, who co-taught the course. Neel Vahil, SOM Class of 2022, recently published a very meaningful narrative medical essay reflecting on his father's death from COVID-19 in *Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA)*. "One of the first things I thought about after my dad died was his sneakers. I know it's an odd thing to fixate on after your dad dies, but the image of his sweaty socks, still in his sneakers from the last time he used the elliptical, haunts me. When someone you love dies unexpectedly there isn't any closure. You are left with a hamper of their dirty clothes, strands of their hair on a comb and the painful realization that you have programmed them into a future that

Children's Environmental Health Subject of New Area of Concentration

Due to differences in behavior and biology, children are often more vulnerable to pollutants and other environmental factors that lead to a wide array of common chronic diseases and other health issues, including asthma and cancer, making it integral that pediatric health care professionals are well prepared to recognize and address environmental aspects to disease. Despite this, "many pediatricians in New York report that they are not comfortable managing environmental aspects of disease and that prior data shows that only 20 percent are even trained to suspect the environment as a cause of disease,"



according to Amy Brown, M.D., M.B.E., assistant professor of pediatrics and adjunct associate professor of public health at NYMC and a pediatric pulmonologist and children's environmental health specialist for Boston Children's Health Physicians and Maria Fareri Children's Hospital at WMC.

With the goal of providing enhanced foundational support to better address environmental-based exposures for future pediatricians, the SOM recently introduced an area of concentration (AOC) in Children's Environmental Health. The longitudinal educational program, taken on an elective basis, provides SOM students with enriched opportunities in core facets of academic children's environmental health, including educational experiences, clinical consultation, community advocacy and environmental research.

The introduction of the new AOC in children's environmental health grew from the success of a summer training program in pediatric pulmonology, allergy, immunology and sleep medicine, offered in

conjunction with the Children's Environmental Health Center of the Hudson Valley, that was inspired by Allen Dozor, M.D., professor of pediatrics and clinical public health at NYMC and chief of pediatric pulmonology, allergy, immunology and sleep medicine at WMC. <u>Read full story on programs on children's environmental health.</u>
