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## COLLEGE NOTES

The 83rd session of the New York Medical College opened on July 1. Due to the greatly increased need for doctors, as reported in an earlier issue, the College has adopted an accelerated program by which students may complete four academic years of study in three calendar years. The present term is the first one in the accelerated program.

The entering class numbers 96 students of which 14 are women. It was selected from approximately 1,000 applicants. Thirty-seven different colleges have contributed from among their graduates to this Freshman class, with Columbia, Cornell, New York, and Fordham Universities sending the largest number of students from any single college. The majority of the Freshman students come from New York and New Jersey with a representative group from the New England states and one student each from Arizona and West Virginia.

There are five sons of Alumni entering with this Freshman class: Milton Elliot Landman, son of Dr. Louis Landman, '18; Paul Henry Stillman, son of Dr. Irwin Maxwell Stillman, '18; Leo Douglas Klauber, son of Dr. Joseph C. Klauber, '18; Harry Clinton Sayre, Jr., son of Dr. Harry Clinton Sayre, '05; and William Gettier Herrman, Jr., son of Dr. William Gettier Herrman, '16.

Several new members have also been added to the upper classes. Leopold Bellak has transferred to the Sophomore class from the Medical School of the University of Vienna. Prior to his admission to this College, Mr. Bellak had completed his Master's degree in Psychology at Boston University and also his Master's degree in that field at Harvard University, where he has further completed his resident requirements and the major portion of his thesis for a Doctorate of Philosophy. Mr. Bellak was a Teaching Fellow at Harvard. He was associated with the Harvard Psychological Clinic and a participant in the currently famous Grant study working with Dr. Henry A. Murray, the Psychiatrist.

There are also four transfers into the Junior class. They are Miss Elizabeth L. Brown from Albany Medical College, winner of one of the Schering awards; Miss Miriam F. Heller from Women's Medical College; Hillard Gold and William Tenenblatt from the School of Medicine of the University of North Carolina.

The general quality of the new students is distinctly good. The war seems to have injected a note of added seriousness in the preparation of the majority of pre-medical students, and high hopes are entertained for their success in the College.

College opened on Wednesday, July 1, with a three day orientation program for the new students under the direction of Dr. Hetrick, Dr. Wilson, Miss Helen Louise Baker, and Mr. Roger C. Gay. Miss Baker, who has been newly appointed to the Administrative staff as Student Personnel Director, will assist the Administrative officers in the organization and supervision of extra curricular and extra mural activities. At the opening meeting for the new students Dr. Linn J. Boyd followed the Dean's welcoming remarks with a talk on the traditions of the medical profession and their relation to students during the present crisis. Immediately following the meeting there was a reception given to the new students by the Freshman faculty.

Interesting and instructive programs were scheduled for the first three days of the session. The regular schedule for all classes began on Monday, July 6. With the opening of College there have been several changes in the organization which will be of interest to the Alumni. Dr. Milton J. Wilson, F.A.C.S., has been named Assistant to the Dean. A new department of Public Health and Industrial Medicine has been created under the full time direction of Dr. Lindsley F. Cocheu. Dr. Laura Florence, M.A., B.Sc., M.A.(Aberdeen), Ph.D., has been named Professor of Bacteriology and Director of the newly created Department. Dr. Malcolm L. Carr, D.D.S., has been appointed Assistant Professor of Oral Surgery, Assisting Attending Oral Surgeon, and Acting Head of the Section of Oral Surgery. Dr. Francis D. Speer has been appointed Director of the Clinical Pathology Laboratory which has been incorporated with the Department of Pathology.

Through the generosity of the W. K. Kellog Foundation, the College has received a noteworthy grant of \$10,000 to be used as a revolving loan fund for the assistance of needy medical students and an additional grant of \$4,000 from the Kellog Foundation to be used for Scholarship and Loan funds for students in the School of Nursing. The John and Mary Markle Foundation has established a grant of \$3,400 for further study in the use of *Fluorescein* by members of the College faculty.

## ALUMNI DAY

Alumni Day was observed on Thursday, June 4th. A large number of out-of-town alumni were present, as well as many of the New York City alumni. The program was arranged by Dr. Stephen P. Jewett, Chairman, and Dr. C. M. Witzberger and Dr. S. Thomas Glasser. In the college lobby each department of the College was represented by exhibits and demonstrations. In the college auditorium a "Panel Discussion on Diagnosis and Treatment of Low Back Pain" was presented. Dr. Linn J. Boyd, acting as chairman of this discussion, had as his associates Dr. Anson H. Bingham, Dr. Leon S. Loizeaux, Dr. Thomas I. Hoen and Dr. Frank J. Borrelli. At the conclusion of the program luncheon was served in the cafeteria as guests of the Board of Trustees. Following the luncheon motion pictures of former presidents, and some favorite camera shots of other years, were shown.

The annual business meeting was held following the showing of the movies. Dr. Joseph H. Fobes, presided. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved. Dr. Fobes then introduced Dean J. A. W. Hetrick. Dr. Hetrick spoke of some of the changes which would be necessary due to present world conditions, among them the completing of four academic years in three calendar years. Dr. Stephen P. Jewett, recording secretary, reported that there had been six executive committee meetings held during the year, all presided over by Dr. Joseph H. Fobes. One of the motions passed by the committee was that a service flag be obtained, upon which there would be a star for each graduate in the armed forces of our Country, and also that a roster of the names be prepared. Both the service flag and the roster will have a prominent place in the college lobby. Dr. Carl C. Salzman, Treasurer, reported a balance of \$2772.36 on May 1, 1942. The Necrologist's report was read by Dr. Van Alstyne H. Cornell, which gave the names of 32 Alumni deceased during the year. (These names have appeared in the last four issues of the Chironian).

The report of the membership committee was presented by Dr. Frank J. Borrelli. There are 750 members in the association, of whom 500 have paid their annual dues. An effort will soon be made to re-instate those in arrears, as well as to secure new members. The entire class of 1941 became members of the association, and about 90% of the class of 1942 have already signed applications. The committee on student activities reported that extra-curricular activities have continued as in previous years, and a large percentage of our students showed great interest in their favorite pastimes, such as, Basket-Ball, Swimming, Hobbies, Sculpturing Class, Glee Club, etc.

Dr. Campbell Howard, Editor of the Chironian, reported that the regular quarterly numbers were issued during the year. There was some increase in the cost of production. An effort will be made to overcome this extra cost by obtaining additional advertising and a larger paid-up membership. In the absence of Dr. Milton J. Raisbeck, Chairman of the College Committee, Dr. Fobes reported that several meetings had been held during the year between this committee and a committee of the Board of Trustees. These discussions were most amiable and a co-operative spirit prevailed.

#### BANQUET

The annual banquet was held that evening at the Colonnades of the Essex House. There were 180 alumni at the dinner. A special table was arranged for the fifty-year men, class of 1892, of which there were two present, Dr. Arthur Burton Van Loon, of Albany, N. Y. and Dr. Charles D. Cropsey, of Rutherford, New Jersey. The twenty-five year class re-union and ten year class re-union were well attended. Men in the service who attended the dinner were, Lieutenant Colonel James R. Boyd, M.C., U.S.A., class of '17, and Lieutenant Malcolm L. Colmer of the Class of '38. The graduating class marched in to the tune of the Coronation March and then the entire assembly sang the National Anthem. The Service Flag was presented to the Trustees by the Alumni Association. One hundred and twenty-five Alumni of the College are in the service at this time. President Halsey made a very happy speech thanking the Alumni for their interest in the institution and outlining a very satisfactory year for 1943. The next speaker was the Dean of the College, Dr. J. A. W. Hetrick, class of '18, giving a report on the condition of the College. On behalf of the Alumni Association, the Dean was then presented with a silver tray as a token of appreciation from all his Alumni brothers. His second speech was much more impromptu than the first. Dr. Arthur B. Van Loon, Chairman of the Medical Grievance Committee of the State of New York, spoke for the fifty year class. He outlined some of his duties on the Grievance Committee. Commissioner of Hospitals, Dr. Edward M. Bernecker, congratulated the College on the work that it is doing. Other guests at the Speakers' Table were Dr. Frank J. Borrelli, President of the Homeopathic Medical Society of the State of New York, Dr. I. Herbert Scheffer, Medical Superintendent of Metropolitan Hospital, Dr. Jeremiah T. Simonson, President of the Homeopathic Medical Society of the County of New York, and Mr. Homer Wickenden, Acting Superintendent of the Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals. The President of the Senior Class, Letitia Ciaramelli, responded for her class. The Editor of the Fleur-o-scope, Joseph Shapse, announced that the Fleur-o-scope this year was dedicated to the men in Service.

## CLASS DAY

Class Day Exercises was held on Friday, June 5th, in the Auditorium of the College. A motion picture was shown depicting the life of a medical student from the time he enters college until he graduates. This was followed by the presentation of the prizes, which was as follows: to Lionel Umansky was given the prize in internal medicine, a one-year subscription to the American Heart Journal; to Louis Diana, the prize in Obstetrics and Gynecology, a one-year subscription to the American Journal of Obstetrics and Gynecology. Dr. Reuel A. Benson presented the prize in Pediatrics. This was won by his son, Thomas Benson. The awarding of this prize was left to a committee of Pediatricians of which Dr. Benson was not a member. A prize for a student majoring in Public Health, Urology, and Syphilology was given to Emanuel Bizzaro, a one-year subscription to the American Journal of Syphilis, Gonorrhoea, and Venereal Diseases. Dr. Louis Rene Kaufman, Head of the Department of Undergraduate Surgery, awarded the Surgical prizes. First prize was won by Fred Menick, a copy of an outstanding textbook in Surgery. The second prize was won by Michael Horan. Class Day exercises were followed by a luncheon given by the Trustees to the graduating class, their friends and family and the members of the faculty.

## COMMENCEMENT

The 82nd Annual Commencement of the College was held at the New York Academy of Medicine on June 5th in the afternoon. The Invocation and Benediction were pronounced by the Right Rev. John Insley Blair Larned, D.D. Then, following an introductory speech by Dean J. A. W. Hetrick, M.D., F.A.C.S., the Address to the Graduating Class was given by Ralph I. Lloyd, M.D., F.A.C.S. The Hippocratic Oath was administered by Jeremiah T. Simonson, M.D., Mr. Charles D. Halsey, chairman of the Board of Trustees, then conferred the Gold Diplomas to the following members of the class of 1892, commemorating their fiftieth year of graduation. Charles D. Cropsey, M.D., Elbert A. Jones, M.D., James H. MacIvor, M.D., Herman S. Raymond, M.D., Sidney E. Smith, M.D., Arthur B. Van Loon, M.D., and George G. Van Mater, M.D. Graduate degrees were then conferred on the Seventy-seven Medical College Graduates of 1942. The degree of Master of Medical Science was conferred upon, Dr. Walter Lyons Mersheimer, Dr. Bertram Capus, Lieut. Malcolm L. Colmer, and Lieut. Solomon David Klotz.

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On February 9, 1942, President Roosevelt appointed Lieutenant General Joseph W. ## WOMEN'S AUXILIARY

### I. RAISING OF FUNDS

- A. SUPPER DANCE - A most successful supper-dance and bingo party was given at Sherry's on February 15th, 1941, netting the auxiliary \$714.00.
- B. PRIZE BOARDS - These boards were distributed, and a cash prize given with each board. These have brought in \$350.00 to date.
- C. A DOLLAR APPEAL - This appeal was made at the outbreak of war to secure funds to purchase blankets. These blankets were for use in an emergency. So far \$305.00 has been received.

- A. The Auxiliary has entirely re-decorated the children's unit on the second floor. The private rooms have been vastly improved. The walls tinted in pastel shades; ruffled at the window curtains, and re-painted furniture make the rooms very attractive. The ward has been equipped with venetian blinds, gay pictures, refrigerator, and new office furniture. All this for the sum of \$500.00.
- B. A contribution of \$250.00 was made to the Editor of the Bulletin for the issue honoring Doctor Jeremiah T. Simonson, Professor of the Department of Pediatrics.
- C. In November, a much needed recreation room was decorated for the internes. It is attractively and comfortably furnished with lounge, chairs, piano and bridge table.

D. Other items furnished the hospital are lamps, slipcovers, flower vases and pictures.

E. New blankets are being purchased and sixty have already been received.

The annual contributions are as follows: \$100.00 to Y.M.C.A.; \$100.00 Student Loan Fund; \$277.00 Doctors' Endowment Fund; \$50.00 for Children's X-mas Party; \$50.00 for Layettes for Social Service; Magazines and scholarship for Nurses \$35.00.
