

### COLLEGE STUDENTS TAKEN OVER BY ARMY AND NAVY

Instruction of Medical students under Army and Navy auspices started at the Medical College on July 6th, 1943. On July first, two hundred Medical students who had resigned their Commissions as Second Lieutenant in the Medical Administrative Corps in favor of the Army Specialist Training Program were activated in the 3214 Service Command Service Unit of the Army Specialist Training Program, Second Service Command.

The Enlisted Reservists reported to Camp Upton on July first for processing, and after being put through the regular routine of men inducted under Selective Service were returned to the College in time to resume their studies on July sixth. So far only those who held Commissions in the Medical Administrative Corps have been activated, but it has been understood that provisions will be made for other students to become members of this program in the near future.

As these men become eligible they will have similar processing. It is the intention of the Army that the Medical education of these students will continue with the least possible interruption. The men who have been activated are members of the Army, attend classes in uniform, and receive the pay appropriate to their grade as enlisted men. Their tuition and other educational expenses are covered by Government contract.

The present Army staff at the College is under the command of Major Alvin B. Roberson, Jr. who was formerly on the staff of the Professor of Military Science and Tactics at the University of Delaware. The other members are: Master Sergeant William M. Bowley, who has just returned from active service with the Armed Forces in the European Theater and who was a former member of the Parachute Batallion stationed at Fort Benning, Ga.; and Corporal Oscar B. Hieber, who has been transferred here from Fort Niagara where he was doing classification work. Other members will probably be added to the staff at a later date.

The general appearence of the students as they attend classes in uniform is excellent. They report an enjoyable experience at Camp Upton, which can be summed up in the words of one of the Student Government Association Officers who said, "I wouldn't have missed it for a million dollars." Their experiences with First Class Privates and others above the lowly station of the students were most amusing.

The Navy has a similar program, in which 75 of the students are now enrolled. These men reported to Columbia University on July first where they were processed. In two days they were given physical examinations, shots, received their first issue of uniforms and had their first introduction to Military drill. These old salts now refer to the College elevators as "Hoisters" and the various floors as "Decks". Lieutenant Commander J. Robert Hewitt is Laison Officer for the Commanding Officer in charge of all V-12 Units in this vicinity. Military instruction will be given to Naval Trainees two days a week by Lieutenant (j.g.) Thaddeus Alton. Thaddeus J. Bykewicz, Pharmacist Mate, 2nd Class, has been assigned to the Student Health Office.

Since the Army and Navy Training Programs are so new to the College, there is little more to report at this time other than the bare details presented above.

#### VOLUNTEER SERVICE AT THE FLOWER AND FIFTH AVENUE HOSPITALS

The calls of the Government for trained personnel, and the competition of defense industries, have taken away from the hospitals many of their highly trained and valuable employees. It is impossible for hospitals to compete with industry in the matter of wages; therefore one of the greatest sources of help for hospitals has been Volunteer Workers.

Thanks to the leadership of the Red Cross and the Office of Civilian Defense, volunteer service in hospitals has reached a high point of efficiency and at the same time has become fashionable and "the thing to do".

In New York City there are approximately 10,000 women who are serving as Volunteer Nurses' Aides, working regular hours on definite assignments and doing an excellent job.

At the Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospital during the past year 201 such Volunteers have been used, and they have given a total of 18,724 hours of free service. The sources of supply of these women arethe Junior League, Red Cross Nurses' Aide Service, Red Cross Gray Lady Service, Office of Civilian Defense, United Hospital Fund, Women's Auxiliary, Friends of the Staff.

These Volunteers serve in the wards, on the private floors, in the Out-Patient Department, the Social Service Department, the Patients' Library, the Medical College Library; a'so in the Department of Medicine, X-ray Department, Clinical Pathology Laboratory, Record Room, Operating Room Office and School of Nursing.

Steps are now underway in New York to enlist a large number of men workers who will perform orderly duty and other tasks that require a man, particularly at night. It is reported that in New Haven and other cities the number of men workers enrolled for such service is in the thousands. They include bank directors, business executives, and other types of business men. Volunteer workers report great satisfaction in carrying out the duties which are assigned to them.

The importance to the hospital of understanding of hospital work by so large a group of community leaders should prove to be an asset of greatest value. No doubt many of them will wish to continue their interest either in active work or on committees after the war.

Any of the Alumni of the medical college who have friends who would like to undertake such work would do the hospital a great service by urging them to come in to register.

#### STUDENT ACTIVITIES

The Junior class, like the Freshman class, has two teams, Mottola being manager of both teams and captain of Team A, and Schraft captain of Team B. Altogether there are 86 students playing on the league teams.

The Psychology Club met for the first time in the new school year, in the Student Lounge. Dr. Jewett spoke to the group, and a discussion followed his talk.

A Roof Dance was given on July 16th, on the hospital roof for the 'students and nurses. Alfred Mamelok's orchestra played for the dance.

Dr. Joseph H. Fobes has been appointed Lieutenant Colonel and Director of the Affiliated Hospital Unit for the New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals, and the Metropolitan Hospital, under the direction of the U.S. Public Hospital Service, the Office of Civilian Defense, and the United States Army.

The Director would welcome applicants for a commission in this unit. They must be over forty-five years of age, not eligible for the armed forces, and not essential in the Faculty. Alumni are earnestly requested to give this thought. For full particulars see Lieut. Col. Fobes at the College.

# In Memoriam

CAMPBELL, Eugene, '78, Los Angeles, Calif., died on March 13th, 1943.

KEELER, E. Elmer, '86, San Diego, Calif., died on May 5th, 1943.

- SPANG, Henry Augustin, '91, New Haven, Conn. Dr. Spang died on June 12th, 1943. He was seventy-four years old. Among the honorary pallbearers were two of his classmates, Dr. Henry P. Sage and Dr. Maurice F. Linquist. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Rose Mary Murray Spang; four daughters; two sons; a sister and nine grandchildren.
- IRISH, James Herbert, '99, Syracuse, N. Y., died on January 26th, 1943 of arterosclerotic heart disease. Aged 72. He was a member of the Medical Society of the State of N. Y.; Fellow of the American College of Surgeons; served as a Captain in the Syracuse Medical Unit during World War 1, on the staff of the General Hospital.
  - WOOD, Charles Fiske, '01, Westfield, N. J. Dr. Wood was born in Brooklyn, N. Y. He received his early education at the Pratt Institute High School and obtained the Schermerhorn Scholarship at Columbia University, where he was graduated in 1897. He entered our College in the fall of 1897, and was in the honor group, and President of the class of 1900-01. Dr. Wood served his internship in the Cumberland Street Hospital, Brooklyn. He practiced in New York for two years, and then owing to the poor health of his wife, moved to Saginaw, Michigan, where he retired from practice for several years to enter commercial life. Later he came to New Jersey and settled in Westfield in 1935. He retired from practice about two years ago due to a coronary attack. He died on May 3rd, 1943. His wife, Florence, survives him. Dr. Wood was a member of Alpha Sigma Fraternity, and for a time served as Assistant Demonstrator in the Department of Anatomy.
  - ALLEN, G. Herbert, '10, Newark, N. J. Dr. Allen was born in New York City. He graduated from the New York Homeopathic Medical College and Flower Hospital in 1910. He was the head anesthetist at the East Orange General Hospital. Dr. Allen died at the East Orange General Hospital on May 6th, 1943, after an illness of one year. He was fifty-seven years old. Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Leonie Allen of East Orange; his wife, Mrs. Ruth Crawford Allen; three daughters, Mrs. William S. James of Allwood, N. 


