## SOCIAL SERVICE

Social Service appreciates the privilege of again contributing an article to, "The Chironian".

The Department has had a very active year. The following excerpts from the Annual Social Service Report of 1945 giving factual data, is convincing and quite amazing even to its Staff Personnel, viz:

The War and Post-War Periods have been filled with many intricate problems which required the patience and skills of the Social Workers to assist in their solution with the clientele.

The Senior Medical Students of the New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals, participate in a program of Public Health field work in conjunction with the Department of Health of New York City.

The Director of Social Service, Carolyn T. Berry, assists in this program under the direction of Dr. Lindsley F. Cocheu, Professor of Public Health and Industrial Medicine of the New York Medical College.

Monthly classes of 12 students each are held followed by a Seminar for a general discussion of the two home visits each student is required to make, thus giving the student a glimpse into the background of Housing, Social, Economic and Dietary problems; which more often than not aggravate patients' illnesses; and secondly the future doctors will have a more comprehensive knowledge of the youngest medical professional group, "Medical Social Workers" and the interrelation to medical problems. For example:

Student "X" was assigned to make a home visit at the home of Mr. R., whose child was acutely ill in the Hospital.

This home visit revealed that the household consisted of the parents and eleven children in an unheated four room apartment, and another child expected. The only income at the time was Mr. R's. weekly income of \$24.00.

The gas and electric were cut off due to unpaid bills, the children were without shoes and could not go to school, there was insufficient clothing, bedding and furniture. The family were sleeping on rugs on the springs and on the mattresses on the floor. The only food was rice and beans and occasionally a slight variation on pay day.

Student "X's" home visit, when reported to Social Service, was followed by a Home Visit by a Social Worker.

The above facts being known, the Social Worker through interviews and directions, assisted this family with their many problems. The family had formerly been known to the D.P.W., and when a daughter reached her 16th year, she was advised to get a job. She tried two jobs but was not retained in service, she became discouraged and remained at home. Another daughter married. Her husband was called into the Draft and a baby arrived. Owing to an error, the allotment was held up. A son who had a position was injured on the job and compensation had not come through.

The family were afraid to appeal to the D.P.W. again owing to the daughter's inability to hold her job.

Thus the family had colds due to insufficient food, clothing, heat and overcrowded conditions in the apartment.

The Social Worker telephoned the D. P.W., the American Red Cross, the Insurance Company Carrier of Compensation.

The D.P.W. gave financial supplementation and clothing, bedding, and necessary furniture. The Red Cross assisted in getting the allotment through. Compensation finally was received.

Social Service gave immediate assistance on the day the above facts were known, and toys for the children were given at Christmas. The patient in the Hospital was referred for convalescent care on discharge.

A recent Home Visit by the Social Worker finds the family carrying on, although there are too many living in 4 rooms due to the prevailing Housing problems.

An increase in the problems of unwed mothers has also taken a heavy toll of time in the Department.

Due to the increasing work in Social Service, 1946 will see an expanding pro-

gram met by an increased personnel in the Department.

## THE RECORD LIBRARIAN MEETS THE PUBLIC

Before writing this paper, I pondered over it a few days, not being able to decide just what topic would be most interesting. I finally reached the conclusion that as the medical record librarian of today spends a large part of her working day in the demands of the public outside the professional life of the hospital, that this relationship between the medical record librarian and the American public might be a timely and interesting one to discuss.

Dr. Malcolm McEachern has outlined for us the qualifications of a record librarian. We find however, that we must possess the additional qualifications of social consciousness, public relationship, and an almost acute perception of human nature. In the past few years, the rapid growing consciousness of the public to the existence of the hospital case record and its uses has been illuminating, and, at times, alarming. We are besieged daily by people beyond the hospital premises, inquiring about medical records, either their own, or in the case of lawyers, insurance company agents and public health representatives, someone else's record. Each inquiry must be carefully considered, and under what circumstances the sought for information is to be released. We in this group, of course, are all familiar with the prescribed regulations governing the release of medical data, but just how many of our citizens are acquainted with these regulations.

Explaining to John Doe the definite rules adhered to regarding the issuance of medical data, in most instances, requires tact and firmness. The attitude of the average patient toward his medical record is one of possessiveness once he learns he has a record on file in the record department. He feels he has furnished the subject matter for the record,—which is part of his life's story—so why should he not be able to use it for whatever purpose he needs to.

When you stop to consider the vast and varied number of inquiries that reach the record departments daily outside the hospital domain, it appears that the life of the average individual has become a most complex equation. We are constantly resorted to for personal data to be used to grease the wheels of jurisprudence, commerce and industry. This type of inquiry

is of course of non-medical character, and is usually associated with personal identity. Many people are asked to submit copies of birth records, such as when applying for an industrial position, or going into foreign service. They are informed they would not be considered without their birth certificate. Often these certificates were never filed with the Department of Health, or lost in the files. Affidavits of hospitalization periods to help in adjusting personal situations such as re-employment, re-imbursements for hospital expenditures, jurisprudence in social, economic and legal matters, and many similar situations which directly affect the course of the personal life of the patient.

Requests for this kind of data are also received from the American Red Cross, The War Man Power Commission, The Old Age Pension System, The Social Security Board, Federal Bureau of Investigation, The Bureau of Internal Revenue and other well known agencies.

As time marches on, the registered record librarian will find herself in the front ranks of the progressive professions. As the public becomes more and more informed regarding medical records and their uses, it will seek us out. In her daily efficient management of these situations which coordinate her work with the lives of the people, the record librarian contributes in her own way, to the good will of her hospital, and the education of the public mind.

## IN MEMORIAM

**Helfrich, Charles H., Passaic, N. J.,** graduated from the College of the City of New York, and in 1884 from the New York Homeopathic Medical College. He began his study of eye surgery at the New York College of Ophthalmology. Soon after European surgeons had developed mastoidectomy by successfully removing part of the bone surrounding the mastoid cells behind the ear, Dr. Helfrich went to Germany with a group of other Americans, to study the technique at the University of Halle. He was one of the first surgeons to introduce in this country the present day technique of mastoid operations. He was resident at Manhattan State Hospital on Ward's Island, and later resident surgeon and professor of ophthalmology at the New York Ophthalmic Hospital and College. He was also eye and ear consultant to several New York and New Jersey Hospitals. He practiced in New York City for fifty-seven years, until his retirement in 1941, when he made Passaic, N. J. his home. Dr. Helfrich died at the Passaic General Hospital on May 31st, 1946, at the age of eighty-two. Surviving are his wife, Edith Swan Helfrich, and a son, Karl H. Helfrich, of Upper Montclair.

**Church, Charles Herbert, Passaic, N. J.,** son of the late Dr. Charles A. Church who began practice in Passaic in 1876, was born in Norwich, N. Y., on September 10th, 1866. He graduated from the Passaic High School in 1882, and from the New York University, where he received his B.S. degree, in 1887. After spending one year in business he entered the New York Homeopathic Medical College, where he received his M.D. on April 9th, 1891. He interned for one year at Ward's Island Hospital, and then became associated with his father in the practice of medicine in Passaic. He pursued post-graduate work on diseases of the throat at the N. Y. Ophthalmic Hospital. He practiced medicine at Nutley, N. J., Newark, N. J., and in 1915 returned to Passaic. He was a past president of the N. J. State Homeopathic Medical Society, and a past president of the New Jersey Society of Physio-Therapeutics. He wrote many papers for medical journals, treating of orificial surgery, the cure of alcoholism and other sub-

jects. He maintained a lively interest in good government and sound economics. Dr. Church died on Sunday, June 2nd, 1946, after one week's illness. He would have been 80 years old on September 10th. Dr. Church survived his wife, Mrs. Martha E. Pingree Church, a little less than two years. She died on June 18th, 1944, within a few days of their fortieth wedding anniversary. They had no children.

**Goode, John Newton, Saranac Lake, N. Y.,** was graduated from the New York Homeopathic Medical College in 1903. Dr. Goode died on January 23rd, 1946, of arteriosclerosis. Aged 72.

**Piper, Stewart Stowe, Elmira, N. Y.,** graduated from the New York Homeopathic Medical College in 1906. He was a member of the American Medical Association, and served in the Medical Corps of the Army during World War I. Dr. Piper died on January 21st, 1946, aged 69, of cerebral thrombosis, influenza and bronchopneumonia.

**Jenks, Gedney, Hastings-on-Hudson, N. Y.,** was graduated from the New York Homeopathic Medical College in 1908. Dr. Jenks died on January 13th, 1946 of carcinoma of the throat. Aged 66.

**Baer, Oscar, Niagara Falls, N. Y.,** was graduated from the New York Homeopathic Medical College in 1911. He was a past president of the Niagara Falls Academy of Medicine, and of the Niagara County Medical Society. He was a member of the staff of Mt. St. Mary's Hospital; chief of obstetrics and for a time served as Head of the Medical Staff of Memorial Hospital, where he died on December 30th, 1945, of congestive heart failure and hypertension. Aged 67.

**Wallace, Kenneth B., New Rochelle, N. Y.,** was born in New York City. In 1912 he graduated from Williams College, where he was a member of the Gargoyles Club and Alpha Delta Phi, and was captain of the varsity basketball team. He graduated from the New York Homeopathic Medical College in 1916. During World War I he was a captain in the Medical Corps. For more than twenty years he had been attending obstetrics at the New Rochelle Hospital. After an illness of three

months, Dr. Wallace died at the New Rochelle Hospital on May 13th, 1946 at the age of fifty-six. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Esther Miles Wallace, and a sister, Mrs. Edward O. Thorpe.

**Spalding, Lyman J., Suffern, N. Y.** Dr. Spalding was a native of Cadillac, Michigan. He graduated from Brown University, and from the New York Homeopathic Medical College in 1916. He was an eye specialist in the medical department of the Consolidated Edison Company of New York since 1933. Dr. Spalding died of a heart attack on May 15th, 1946. Aged fifty-three. Surviving are his wife, Dorcas Spalding; a sister, Mrs. Thad Knapp, and a nephew, Royal S. Copeland, Jr., son of the late Senator Copeland.

**Astrachan, Girsch D.,** was born in Bere-sino, Russia, and received his M.D. at Jena University, Germany, in 1923. He was a specialist in Dermatology and Syphilology. He was assistant clinical professor at the New York Medical College, and visiting dermatologist at Metropolitan Hospital. He was Associate and attending dermatologist at New York Post Graduate Hospital; Associate at Columbia University, and was also connected with certain hospitals of the City's Department of Correction. He had done pioneer work with various drugs in the threatment of syphilis. Dr. Astrachan died on April 30th, 1946 of a heart attack. Aged 52. He is survived by his wife, a son, and two brothers.

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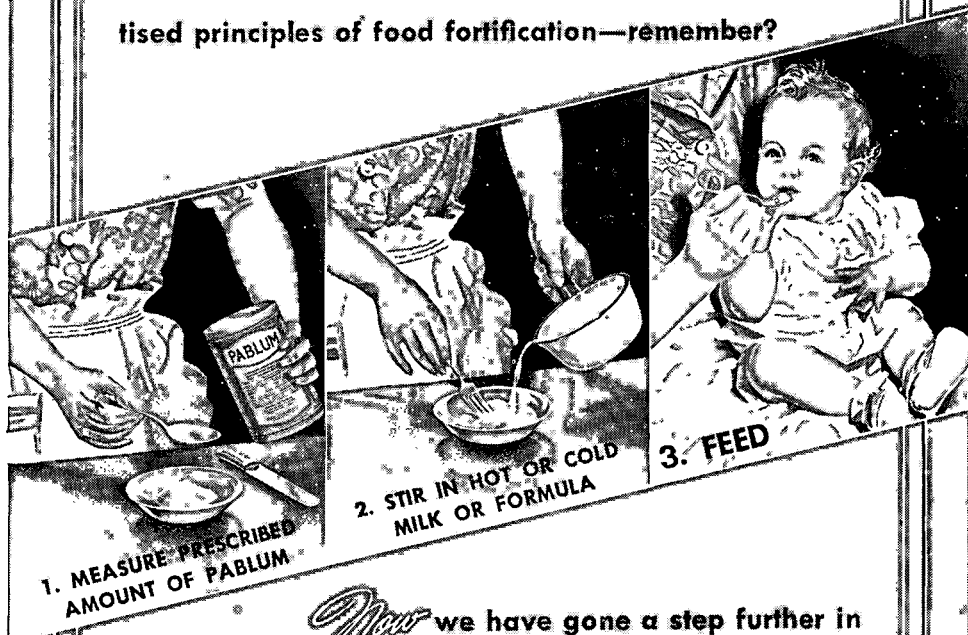
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
