### IN MEMORIAM

COOK, Dr. EDGAR B., Rochester, N. Y. was orn in Rochester, N. Y. on January 10, 1882. He attended Rochester public schools, includng the old Rochester Free Academy, and reeived his M.D. degree from our College in 1903. This past June, 1953, he received his gold diploma in recognition of fifty years ervice in the medical profession. Dr. Cook was a specialist in Orthopedics and was asociated with the Health Bureau for forty rears. He served the Health Bureau as school physician and mental hygiene examiner. For our decades he was a staff member of Genesee Hospital. In World War I, he was stationed at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington. In his routh he had been a city tennis champion, but after the war gave up that hobby in favor of solf and hunting. He was a member of the Corinthian Temple F. and A. M., the Rochester Consistory, the County Medical Society, the Rochester Academy of Medicine and the Kiwanis Club of Rochester. His wife, Elizabeth, was elected national vice-president of the Daughters of the American Revolution in April. She is a former DAR state regent. Dr. Cook died on August 20, 1953, at the age of 11. He had been ill for one week in his home. Besides his wife, he is survived by three laughters, Mrs. Catherine C. Williams, Mrs. Barbara C. Hedquist and Mrs. Mary C. Archer; i brother, James M. of Johnstown, Pa., and hree grand children.

BEATTIE, DR. JOSEPH H., Dobbs Ferry, N. Y. was born in Warwick, Orange Co., N. Y. on September 7, 1879. He graduated from the Warwick Institute in 1898, and received his M.D. degree from our College in 1902. He nterned at the Hahnemann Hospital, New York City, for two years, then took post-gradute study in London, England in 1904, and since 912 was on the staff of the Dobbs Ferry Hosoital. Dr. Beattie was a specialist in Geriatrics. He served in France as a Major with the Army Medical Corp during World War I. He was an rdent philatelist, and was a founder and first resident of the Westchester Philatelist Society, nd a member of several other philatelist soieties. He was President of the Greenburgh avings Bank, Dobbs Ferry, and a director of he Dobbs Ferry Bank. Dr. Beattie was a pember of the American Medical Association, he Medical Society of the State of New York, he Westchester Medical Society and the Amerian Institute of Homeopathy. Dr. Beattie died n Sunday, August 16, 1953 aboard the Cunard iner Mauretania while en route to England or a five weeks vacation with his wife, Mrs.

Loretta Jones Beattie. He was 73 years old. Besides his wife, a brother, John Beattie of Warwick, survives.

BARNES, Dr. Frank Haslehurst, was born in Mohawk, Herkimer County, N. Y., on June 17, 1872. He graduated from the Utica Academy in 1891 and received his M.D. degree from our College in 1896. He interned for one year and served a residency at Gray Towers Sanitarium. He then entered the Post Graduate Medical School, New York City, and became an instructor and clinical assistant at the Post Graduate Hospital. He came to Stamford, Conn. in 1896 as an assistant to Dr. J. J. Kindred, operator of a sanitarium, and in 1898 bought the sanitarium from him, and until May 25, 1952 was psychiatrist, owner and director of the Barnes Sanitarium. His specialty was Mental and Nervous Disorders. Dr. Barnes was a Diplomate of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, a Fellow of the American Medical Association, and a Fellow of the American Psychiatry Association. His hospital connections were with St. Joseph's Hospital, Stamford, and Greenwich Hospital. During World War I, Dr. Barnes was on the Stamford Medical Advisory Board. He was a member of the American Medical Association, Connecticut State Medical Society, Stamford Medical Society, American Psychiatric Society and the Woodway Country Club. Dr. Barnes died on September 14, 1953 in Stamford Hospital, after a long illness. He was 81 years old. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Ella Betts German Barnes; a brother, Dr. Harold L. Barnes; and a sister, Miss Margaret Barnes.

BEYER, Dr. WILLIAM, Edgewater, N. J. was born in Brooklyn, N. Y. on December 6, 1899. After completing his public school and high school in Brooklyn, he graduated from New York University, and received his M.D. degree from our College in 1927. He interned at Flower Hospital. His hospital connections were with Englewood Hospital and Holy Name Hospital. Dr. Beyer entered active Military Service on December 9, 1940 with the grade of Major, Medical Corps, and commanded the 34th Field Hospital (Combat) in Africa and Italy. He was promoted to Lt. Col. in April, 1943, and again to Colonel, M.C., in 1945 and returned to inactive status in Medical Reserve on January 10, 1946, in grade of Colonel. He was a member of the Bergen County Medical Society, Alpha Sigma, Englewood Kiwanis, the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars. Dr. Beyer died on August 20, 1953 of Carcinoma of the Stomach, at

the age of 53. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Winifred Beyer; a daughter, Mrs. Barbara Ann MacIver; and a son, William A. Beyer.

CRISCILLO, DR. SERAFINO L., Bronx, N. Y. was born in New York City in 1904. He received his M.D. degree from our College in 1931, and served his internship and residency at the Yonkers General Hospital. He was on the G. U. staff of the Morrisania Hospital and was connected with several other hospitals in Westchester County. Dr. Criscillo died rather suddenly of a heart attack on August 15, 1953 at the age of 49. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Irma Criscillo; and one daughter, Adrienne, age 15.

MERRIT, DR. WILLIAM HERBERT, New York, N. Y.—Dr. Merrit received his M.D. degree from the New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals, in 1934. He was a specialist certified by the American Board of Radiology, a member of the American College of Radiology, and was affiliated with the following hospitals: Boulevard Hospital in Long Island City, Mount Sinai Hospital, Montefiore Hospital for Chronic Diseases, Hospital for Joint Diseases, Beth Israel Hospital and the Manhattan State Hospital. Dr. Merrit died of heart failure on July 4, 1953 at the age of 43.

WHITE, DR. FRANK MELVIN, MILES, Va.; received his M.D. degree from the New York Homeopathic Medical College and Flower Hospital in 1915. Dr. White died on July 30, 1953, at the age of 73, of cerebral embolism.

### **COLLEGE OPENING**

The College opened its 94th year on Monday, September 14, 1953, with classes in the College Building on 20 East 106th Street. The Freshman class, consisting of 123 men and 5 women, met on September 11th in the College Auditorium. They were welcomed to the College Family by President Hetrick, Dean Snyder and the Presidents of the Student Senate and the Inter-Fraternity Council. Following this program, the students were taken on guided tours in the College Building by upper classmen and a buffet luncheon was served in the College Library for the Freshman Faculty and the incoming class.

Among the members of the Freshman class this year are Mr. Thomas E. Hunt, son of Russell Hunt, M.D. '31, Mr. Stanley Taub, son of Jacob Taub, Assistant Professor of Pathology, and Miss Rosemary E. Terranova, daughter of Rosario Terranova, M.D. '32, Assistant Professor of Physiology and Pharmacology.

With the present Freshman class, the total enrollment of the College is 478 students,

representing 128 freshman, 119 sophomores 119 juniors and 112 seniors.

Among the members of the Freshman class 9 different States and 58 different undergradu ate colleges are represented.


