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### IN MEMORIAM

Lane, Irvin J., Ossining, N. Y., was born in North Clove, Dutchess County, N. Y. on April 24th, 1861. He attended Fishkill Village High School, and received his M.D. degree from the New York Homeopathic Medical College and Flower Hospital, in 1883. Dr. Lane was an ardent Homeopath, and a member of a number of Homeopathic Societies. He practiced for fifty years in Ossining, New York. He was a director of the Westchester County Savings and Loan Association since its incorporation in 1920. Dr. Lane died at the Earle Nursing Home, Middletown, N. Y. on October 27th, 1953, at the age of 92. He is survived by three sons and two daughters.

St. John, Byron Douglas, M.D., Port Washington, L. I., N. Y., was born in Walton, New York on April 18th, 1895. He graduated from Walton High School; The Mercersburg Academy, and received his M.D. degree from the New York Medical College in 1921. He interned at Hahnemann Hospital, New York, N. Y., 1920-1922, and then took post-graduate study in Cardiology and Internal Medicine, which became his specialty. Dr. St. John was a Diplomate of the American Board of Internal Medicine. His hospital connections were with Meadowbrook Hospital, Nassau Hospital, and Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals. He was a member of the Meissen Club; American Medical Association, and the Nassau County Medical Society. Dr. St. John died suddenly of a heart attack on December 15th, 1953 at the age of 58. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Mildred E. St. John, and one daughter, Jane R. St. John.

PISCIOTTA, Dr. JOSEPH, Brooklyn, N. Y. was born in Italy on August 15th, 1887, and came to this country at the age of ten. He was gratuated from Boys' High School in Brooklyn, and received his M.D. degree from Flower in 1914. Dr. Pisciotta practiced Pediatrics for 32 years in Bensonhurst, until he became ill in 1950. He was on the staff of Post Graduate Hospital, New York, for 19 years; on the staff of St. Mary's Hospital, Brooklyn, for 9 years, and an attending pediatrician at Norwegian Hospital up to the time of his death. During World War II he served with the Selective Services Board for three years, receiving Honorable recognition from the late Franklin D. Roosevelt. Dr. Pisciotta passed away at Norwegian Hospital on November 19th, 1953, at the age of 66 years. Surviving are his widow Paula A., a daughter, Tionette (Pisciotta) Gordon, R.N., also a graduate of Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals, and a son, Lewis A., an aeronautical engineer, who is at present with the armed services stationed at Cocoa, Florida.

MacAdam, Dr. Edward Wallace, Bronx, N. Y., was born on September 26th, 1874. He received his M.D. degree from the New York Homeopathic Medical College in 1907, and served his internship at Metropolitan Hospital, where he became chief of staff. He was a specialist in Internal Medicine, and was Associate Professor of Medicine, and Associate Attending Physician at the New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals, where he served on the faculty for more than forty years. Dr. MacAdam was a member of the New York County Homeopathic Medical Society, and a past president of the New York State Homeopathic Society. He was also a member of the Dunham Club, Alpha Sigma Fraternity, Alpha Delta Phi Fraternity, Pathological Society, and The American Institute of Homeopathy, where he served as Treasurer for many years, and was editor of the Journal of Homeopathy for the years of 1945 and 1946. Dr. MacAdam died at his home on November 16th, 1953, at the age of 79. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Theresa Forsstrom MacAdam, and two daughters, Mrs. Margaret A. Cort, and Miss Barbara G. MacAdam.

MOORE, SAMUEL BARLOW, A.B., M.D., Class of 1901, died of a heart attack Sunday, January 17, 1954 while sitting in his car in front of his beloved Church, St. Thomas More, 89th Street between Madison and Park, New York City.

Sam entered College in September 1897 a tall, rosy cheeked lovable lad. Through all his life he has been the same. Member and active officer in Alpha Sigma-Alpha Club and A.K.K. fraternity, Dunham Club, Meissen-Unanimous Club, Alumnus Trustee of the College, Consulting Physician at Metropolitan and Flower Hospitals, Member of the New York Academy of Medicine and many other Societies are just a few of his active associations. born in Owego, New York, graduated from Manhattan College in 1897 and in our College in 1901. His son also a graduate, Samuel Barlow Moore, Jr., was his associate. Also surviving are his wife, Mrs. Agnes Rooney Moore, another son, Robert E. Moore and two daughters, Mrs. Marian Beattie of Detroit and Mrs. Frances Callan of Great Neck.

UNITED STATES NAVAL RESERVE for service as set forth in the following CITATION:

"for heroic conduct in saving numerous men from drowning while serving on board the U.S.S. VAL-COUR during the collision of that ship with the S.S. THOMAS TRACY off the Virginia Capes on 14 May 1951. Despite the grave danger imposed by burning oil on the surface of the water following the collision, Lieutenant (then Lieutenant, Junior Grade,) Ladenheim unhesitatingly dived into the sea in a bold attempt to rescue his drowning shipmates. Although near exhaustion and repeatedly drifting away from the vessel in the smoke-covered water, he bravely continued to assist the struggling men in their attempts to clamber aboard the life rafts. By his cool courage, perserverance and selfless efforts in behalf of others at the risk of his own life, Lieutenant Ladenheim upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."


