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

NEW WING OF COLLEGE BUILDING

FIRST STEP IN LONG-RANGE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Building and Development Fund Campaign Opens This Month

For the sixth time in its ninety-five year history, New York Medical College has outgrown its home. Lecture rooms are bulging at the seams, laboratories are overflowing, classes are being held in two shifts, important research is being carried on in what otherwise might be storerooms. The situation, however, is being remedied, as evidenced by the photograph on our cover.

The College will launch this month the first phase of a long-range program designed to make our alma mater one of the best equipped medical training and research centers in the metropolitan area. As a first step in this program, the Board of Trustees authorized construction of an addition to the present College Building.

The new wing, when completed, will be a six story building contiguous with the present structure. It will be used to house lecture rooms, laboratories, research facilities, clinics and offices. It is currently in an advanced stage of construction.

To relieve the present congestion, urgently needed classrooms and offices will be provided for the growing Department of Public Health. Additional offices and enlarged clinic facilities will be made available to the Departments of Urology, Obstetrics and Gynecology, and Psychiatry. Present research facilities will be more than doubled, and several important new projects will be given room for active growth. Among others, the laboratory unit for investigation of blood and circulation, and that for study of virus diseases will benefit from the availability of proper quarters.

In the new wing, the Medical Library and the Medical Record File will have convenient, combined facilities. This unique arrangement will make it possible for both students and faculty members to study a case history with full medical literature bearing upon it readily accessible.

When the structure is completed, probably by the Fall of 1956, it and its equipment will have cost approximately \$1,000,000. To defray this expense, the College is preparing to launch its Building and Development Fund campaign, the first public fund raising project undertaken in sixty-six years, and only the second in the College's ninety-five year history. Mr. Spyros P. Skouras, President of Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corp., will serve as Honorary Chairman

of the campaign, with Dr. Hetrick and Mr. Halsey as honorary vice chairmen.

As alumni, we will have an important role to play in the forth-coming campaign. With the Trustees, the Faculty, the students, the nurses, the employees, and the many friends of the College working alongside us, we can justify the faith of those who have gone ahead with the much-needed new structure by giving and raising the funds needed to pay for it.

This year we are being asked to give not only our annual Alumni Fund gift, but to add to it, in the form of a three-year pledge, a substantial contribution to the Building and Development Fund. There are more than 2,700 of us who received our professional training at the College and in the Hospitals. Each of us, then, should be eager to help. And the burden will not be great. Spread over three years, our gifts can be generous. If all of us get behind this project enthusiastically, we can assure the attainment of our goal. Friends and patients, too, may wish to contribute, and each of us can help by actively soliciting their gifts.

Let's all get behind this project, give it everything we've got, and make it certain that the cost of the wing will be fully subscribed long before it is finished. There will be more details in our next issue, of course, and in the meantime you will be hearing from Alumni Section Chairman John Herrlin, as well as from campaign headquarters. Make your plans now, though, to be a part of this effort as an indication of your interest in and loyalty to your College.

As for the long range program, full details have not been formulated completely. Following, however, is an outline of some of the most important features which will be incorporated in it: A fund of some two million dollars for pure and applied research, to be used at the discretion of the College without restriction as to projects; an in-patient psychiatric unit of 100 beds, among the most urgently needed services in the City; greatly increased clinic facilities for the Pediatric Service; a student residence with accommodations for both married and unmarried students; and a residence for student nurses, which has a very high priority in view of the fact that two floors of the Hospitals Building are now being utilized for this purpose.

HONORARY CHAIRMAN



Spyros P. Skouras, President of Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corp., has been appointed Honorary Chairman for the Building and Development Fund Campaign underway at New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals.

Spyros P. Skouras was 17 years old when he came to America from Greece in 1910 to join his older brother, Charles, who has since passed away. His first job was as a busboy, and four years later he pooled his savings with his two brothers and started in the theatre business with a controlling interest in the Olympia Theatre in St. Louis, a 1200 seat house. By 1926, he and his brothers controlled 37 theatres which were later sold to the Warner Brothers and Mr. Skouras joined the Company as General Manager of the theatre circuit. In 1931, he joined Paramount as president of a subsidiary formed to operate all Paramount theatres and with his brothers he headed the Wesco Corporation, a holding company in which all Twentieth Century-Fox theatre interests were merged. By 1942, the year he was elected President of Twentieth Century-Fox, the company controlled 564 theatres.

Mr. Skouras is internationally known and respected for his contributions to the welfare of humanity throughout the world. His theatres during the last war were the first to become issuing agents for Treasury Department War Bonds. He was the organizational head of Greek War Relief; the film industry's Red Cross division; Chairman of the Motion Picture Committee of American Brotherhood Week sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews and the film industry's sub-committee for the United Jewish Appeal. Other campaigns he has been active with include the Jewish

Federation Building Fund Drive, the Alfred E. Smith Memorial Drive, the National Arthritis Research Foundation and numerous others. He served on the Cardinal's Committee of the Laity for Catholic Charities; National Committee of the Emergency Food Collection for the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation; President Truman's Citizens Food Committee and is Chairman of the Extension of the World Brotherhood Movement.

Mr. Skouras holds an Honorary Degree of Doctor of Humane Letters conferred upon him by New York Medical College in 1954 for his philanthropical work and his leadership in the field of visual education.

CHARTER DAY AT NEW YORK MEDICAL COLLEGE

William Cullen Bryant, who founded New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospital in 1860, walked again on Charter Day, Tuesday, April 12th, with his beautiful wife. They revisited the College and saw the \$1,000,000 building under construction as part of the ten-year expansion and development program. Ronald J. Pion, a junior medical student, played the part of the famous poet and Patricia Swartzbaugh, a student nurse, was his wife. They were picturesquely clad in costumes of 95 years ago when the school was founded. William Cullen Bryant (portrait in background) was the son and grandson of physicians and namesake of a third. Remembered chiefly by his poetry today, he was equally famous in his lifetime for his leadership in promoting civic developments as editor of the Evening Post. He not only originated the idea of New York Medical College, but served as its first president.

FEBRUARY MEETING BOARD OF GOVERNORS

The meeting of the Board of Governors of the Alumni Association of the New York Medical College was called to order at 3 P.M. in room 509 of the College on Thursday, February 3, 1955 by the President, Dr. Lawrence Slobody.

PRESENT: Drs. Blankfein, Borrelli, Cornell, Hayner, Herrlin, Kuntze, Lillick, Mersheimer, Napp, Salzman, Slobody, Snyder, Stone, Turtz, Wershuh, and Wilson.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE: Dr. Napp reported a total of 1,270 members for the Alumni Association, of these 965 are senior members and the remaining are junior members. Dr. Thomas H. Evans was proposed for honorary membership in the Alumni Association by Dr. Hayner and seconded by Dr. Kuntze. It was unanimously passed by the Board. The question of others for possible honorary or associate membership was discussed in general and the list of names will be reviewed by all members of the Board for possible presentation at the next meeting. Such lists of non alumni members of the faculty were circulated to all present, and will also be provided to those not present.

TREASURY REPORT: The Treasurer reported a balance of \$4,426.47.

BANQUET COMMITTEE: Dr. Salzman reported that the Annual Alumni Banquet will be held on Monday, the 6th of June, 1955. This constitutes a departure from the usual Tuesday night banquet and was necessitated by the change this year in the day for graduation. Graduation will take place on Tuesday, June 7th. Dr. Salzman reiterated a previous decision of the Board in that there will be no business

meeting at the banquet, instead, it will be held at 2:00 P.M. in the College Auditorium. The President's Reception will take place as in past years. In all probability, the banquet will be held at the Hotel Plaza, but presently another hotel is being given consideration. The definite decision on this will be published in the next issue of the Chironian.

ELECTIONS COMMITTEE: Dr. Herrlin presented for re-election the present list of incumbents. A motion by Dr. Salzman for acceptance of the present officers for re-election was seconded and passed by the Board. Dr. Wershuh moved and Dr. Snyder seconded a motion that the portion of the new constitution concerning election of officers be published in the April Chironian. Hereafter, this report of the Nominating Committee should and will be published in the January issue to precede Ground Hog Day. The announcement as to choice of the outstanding alumnus of the year was deferred.

BUILDING FUND: Dr. Borrelli made a motion which was seconded and unanimously passed that Dr. John S. Herrlin be designated the alumni representative on the Building Fund Drive.

GROUND HOG DAY: As of this meeting 52 affirmative replies have been received and all members of the Board of Governors were urged to contact as many alumni as possible about the smoker.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 P.M.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

ARTICLE V - ELECTION OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. Nominations for officers in the Association may be made by the Board of Governors or by the written petition of any regular member of the Association. In the latter case, the petition must be signed by not less than *ten* regular members of the Association, including the petitioner, all of which must be in good standing. The names of all candidates for all officers must be in the hands of the Secretary at least one month before the Annual Meeting.

SECTION 2. Voting. The privilege of voting shall be restricted to regular and associate members in good standing and all ballots must be written and mailed or otherwise delivered to the proper persons in accordance with the rules governing elections as set forth by the Board of Governors. Polls and all balloting must be

PRESIDENT'S BIRTHDAY PARTY



The Prexy's Birthday Party, in honor of Dr. J. A. W. Hetrick, one of the most popular events on the College calendar, was held this year on Thursday, March 24th.

The celebration started in the afternoon with free lunches served in the tea room. That evening a dinner was held for members of the Faculty and the officers of the Student Association at which Dr. Hetrick was presented with a bound volume, containing a compilation of the messages he wrote through the years in the student's yearbook, the *Fleuroscope*. This volume was titled, "*Fleuroscopic Findings*".

At 8:30 P.M., "*Gels and Sols*", an original production by the junior class was presented in the auditorium to entertain Dr. Hetrick and his guests. "*Gels and Sols*", is the story of a medical student and his "struggle for internship". Along the way the hero suffers a slight setback of 14 years trying to pass Anatomy. Although he was ungifted for the science of Anatomy, he was not completely void of talents; he had patience; he had fortitude; and he had a beautiful nurse who stood by him for the duration of his Anatomy career, 14 long arduous years. At the finish . . . "perseverance wins again". His Anatomy professor cancels the final exam, our hero passes, becomes an intern and he and his aging sweetheart make the final altaration.

Frank Hall, a talented junior, played the medical student and gave an excellent performance. Ronald Pion, President of the Junior class did a creditable job in his capacity as producer and director of the show.

After the final curtain, Mrs. Hetrick was called to the stage to assist Dr. Hetrick in cutting the cake and was presented with a beautiful bouquet of red and talisman roses, symbolic of the school colors. Dancing and merriment continued in the auditorium to the music of the school band, the "*Fibrillating Five*".

HOBBY SHOW

The 18th Annual Hobby Show for doctors, medical students, nurses, student nurses and other personnel was held in the student lounge of the College on February 24th and 25th.

The gold cup donated annually by the Alumni Association was awarded Dr. William Langan, Assistant Professor in the Department of Physiology for his magnificent display of African violets and other plants grown under fluorescent lighting. Dr. Langan pointed out that the blossoms grown in this manner are much larger than those grown under ordinary conditions.

A second cup was awarded this year as a new procedure to stimulate Hobby Show interest among new students. It will be given annually from now on, in a special competition between freshmen and freshmen faculty. It went to Lewis Brinton for his collection of African curios. Lewis Brinton was born in the Belgian Congo, Africa, and his collection included Witch Doctor's medicine bag and fetishes they use for medicines; two-blade cannibal sword; crown of one of the kings; drum; meal sifter; carvings; and a painting by an African native showing the modern trend. Brinton is a freshman medical student who will return to Africa as a medical missionary upon completion of his medical training. His father is the Reverend Thomas Brinton, retired missionary, and his brother is the Reverend Howard Brinton, active missionary in the Belgian Congo.

Another outstanding entry included a collection of rare and unusual chess sets by Dr. Jacob Taub, Assistant Professor in Pathology. One is a traveling chess set which he designed himself, design patent applied for. The chess figures are carried in a zippered bag, and the bag opens to form a board. Other sets include one with red and white figures in garnet, valued at \$50.00 per man; a Mexican set carved in wood; teakwood set, and two carved ivory sets of sculptural beauty.

Dr. Louis René Kaufman, Professor of Clinical Surgery and Attending Surgeon, had an unusual collection of items from an authentic Napoleonic collection.

There were many other interesting hobbies displayed in the fields of painting, photography, collections, etc.

The Hobby Show attracted a great deal of attention and wide interest throughout the city. It was covered by newspaper photographers from the N. Y. Times, the N. Y. Daily News, the N. Y. Daily Mirror, The World Telegram and Sun, The N. Y. Journal American and was sent all over the country by the United Press.

his M.D. degree from the New York Homeo-
pathic Medical College in 1895. He served dur-
ing World War I and in 1937 was awarded an
honorary Doctor of Science from Albright Col-
lege in Reading, Pennsylvania. Dr. Wintch was
on the consulting staff of St. Mary's Hospital
in Passaic, N. J., Irvington General Hospital
and the Essex County Sanatorium in Verona,
N. J. Other affiliations were with the Montclair
Community Hospital and the Martland Medical
Center. He was the founder and chief surgeon
of the Bethany Home for the Aged and on the
senior staff of Presbyterian Hospital, where he
died on December 18, 1954, aged 83 of acute
myocardial failure.

FIEDELMAN, HARRY L., Brooklyn, N.Y., was
born in New York City on June 2, 1905. He at-
tended New York University and received his
M.D. degree from the New York Medical Col-
lege in 1930. He served his internship and re-
sidency in internal medicine at Kings County
Hospital in Brooklyn. He was Assistant Physi-
cian at Kings County and Israel Zion Hospitals
and a member of the Kings County Medical
Society. Dr. Fiedelman passed away on March
17th, 1955 of Acute Hemolytic Anemia at the
age of 49. Surviving are his wife, Gertrude, and
two sons, William and Jeffrey.
