PROMOTIONS

REGISTRAR ABNER H. GROFF has been promoted to Assistant Dean for Student Services of Touro College School of Law, Pres. Bernard Lander announced this week. Dean Groff will continue to serve as College Registrar. Concurrently, Dr. Lander announced the promotion of EDWARD E. SHABES from Assistant to Associate Registrar.

IN-SERVICE TRAINING

Touro is providing in-service training for administrators and teachers in the use of computers in realizing educational goals for a consortium of area school districts. Members of the consortium are Bronx, District 9, Yonkers, New Rochelle, Mount Vernon, and White Plains. Classes are being held at District 9 headquarters, 1377 Jerome Avenue, close to Touro's Bronx extension center. The consortium is the recipient of a grant from Radio Shack Corp. and the program is being conducted in conjunction with the Center for Learning Technologies of the New York State Education Department.

APPOINTED CHAIRMAN

DR. DAVID LUCHINS, assistant dean of students, has been appointed chairman of the Communal Relations Commission of the Orthodox Union. This commission examines community, social, and public affairs issues that affect synagogues and the Orthodox Jewish community, and disseminates information and program recommendations based on these findings. Dr. Luchins is a national vice president of the Orthodox Union.

A NEW PROGRAM

Touro, in conjunction with Summit Collegiate Studies Center, Jerusalem, has opened a Center for Occupational Learning to serve the special needs of learning disabled young adults. Touro's center is offering two-year certificate programs in a variety of career areas. These include health, child, and gerontology care, hotel and food trades, recreation, animal care, clerical and sales work, horticulture, photography, beauty culture, graphic arts, auto mechanics, library services, and homemaking. Summit has pioneered the concept of "college enabling" for young people with learning disabilities, maintaining that "through the implementation of a complete 'human support system,' college may be a possibility for those who otherwise would not succeed." Dr. Leon Perkal, assistant dean of the School of General Studies, is serving as coordinator of this new outreach program of the college.

HAROLD LIFSHITZ, a member of the counseling staff, passed his oral defense of his dissertation on December 21 and has been awarded a Ph.D. in educational psychology by Fordham University. The title of his dissertation is "Personality Characteristics and Community Health Ideology."

Paxton appeared in "Martyrdom and Resistance," (Fall 1982) An essay "The Struggle for an Allied Jewish Fighting Force," recently completed by Dr. Penkower, will be published in Perspective on the Holocaust by Kluwer-Nijhoff (R. Braham, Ed.) in June 1983.
