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

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ALUMNI OF THE YEAR

FREDERICK M. DEARBORN

Frederick M. Dearborn was born in Boston, Massachusetts on July 13, 1876, the son of Henry M. Dearborn, Professor of Dermatology at our College. He graduated from the Townsend Harris Hall and four years later received his A.B. degree from the College of the City of New York in 1897. He graduated from the New York Medical College in 1900 and served an undergraduate internship at Cumberland Street Hospital from 1900-1901. He then did postgraduate work in Dermatology in Paris, Berlin, and Vienna as well, special studies in pellagra in Italy in 1906 and investigations in certain tropical diseases in South America before and after that date.

He is a life member of the Veterans of the Seventh Regiment, Sons of the Revolution, Society of Colonial Wars, Continental Lodge No. 287, F. and A.M. of all the Scottish Rite Bodies of the Valley of New York and the Mecca Temple of the Mystic Shrine. He is a member of Delta Kappa Epsilon, the Alpha Chapter of Phi Alpha Gamma, Military Order of Foreign Wars, Seventh Regiment New York Post No. 107 of the American Legion, Army Athletic Association, National Geographic Society, Metropolitan Museum of Art, American Museum of Natural History and Manuscript Society.

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JOSEPH HENRY FOBES

Joseph H. Fobes was born in Brooklyn on October 29, 1878. His parents were of Scotch New England descent and both came of Mayflower stock from Plymouth County, Massachusetts. His mother was a founder of Prospect Heights Hospital in Brooklyn.

Early in his life he moved to East Orange, N. J. and in 1897 he graduated with honors from the East Orange High School. He was an ardent athlete and played on the championship baseball and football teams. Dr. Fobes also excelled in tennis and recently won an award for his outstanding game of golf.

Entering New York Medical College in 1897, he received his Medical Degree on May 29, 1901, graduating third in his class and passing the Regents Examination with a purple seal. He served his internship and residency at Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals from 1901-1903.

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SPRAGUE CARLETON

Sprague Carleton was born in New York City on May 6, 1881. His father, Bukk G. Carleton, was Professor of Urology at New York Medical College. He attended Oberlin College and Rutgers University and received his Medical Degree in 1906. After serving his internship at Grace Hospital in New Haven, he became assistant to Dr. Sanger at Littleton, New Hampshire. He did post-graduate study at the Mayo Clinic and urological clinics throughout London and Paris. Dr. Carleton began his professional career with his father at 75 West 50th Street, New York City.

His appointment to the faculty of New York Medical College came in 1907 as Clinical Assistant of Genito-Urinary Surgery. In 1908 he was made Lecturer of G.U. Surgery; Assistant Professor from 1909-1912; Professor of G.U. Surgery 1912-1923 and Professor and Head of Department from 1923-1949. In July 1949 he was appointed Professor and Director of the Department of Graduate Urology and holds this position at the present time. Dr. Carleton also serves as Consulting Urologist at the Yonkers General Hospital, Yonkers, N. Y.; the Fitkin Memorial Hospital, Neptune, N. J.; and the Charlotte Hungerford Hospital, Torrington, Connecticut.

In 1918 Rutgers University awarded Dr. Carleton an Honorary M.A. Degree and upon his retirement as Professor and Director of the Department of G.U. Surgery in 1949, he was presented with a replica of the New York Medical College Mace. He served as Major in the Medical Corps reserve for 15 years and on the advisory draft board during World War I.

Dr. Carleton was elected to Fellowship in the American College of Surgeons at its second meeting in 1914. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Urology and held membership in the Academy of Pathological Science, the American Institute of Homeopathy, the New York Academy of Medicine, the Helmuth Club and the Meissen-Unanimous Club. He served as President of the American Institute of Homeopathy.

As a teacher, consultant and author, his work has been distinguished by a most original and interesting viewpoint. His publications have been reprinted many times for their unusual value.

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He served as Demonstrator and Lecturer in Anatomy at the College. He has written or edited eleven books, five of which concerned his specialty, the others being of a travel or historical nature including the "History of the Metropolitan Hospital" which appeared in 1937. He served in the Spanish American War, was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel, and Chief of Medical Service, Base Hospital No. 48 and Commanding Officer of the Convalescent Camp, Mars Hospital Center, September 1918. He was decorated with the Order of the Purple Heart and other decorations. Besides the study of military history his principal avocation has been the collection of autographs which is probably one of the finest collections in the country.

He is a Fellow of the American Board of Dermatology and Syphilology since its start, Diplomate of the American Board of Dermatology and Syphilology, Society for Investigative Dermatology, Association of Military Surgeons and a life member of the American Medical Society of Vienna. He has been Visiting or Consulting Dermatologist to twelve different hospitals in New York, Connecticut and New Jersey. He was a member of the staff of the Metropolitan Hospital for 35 years, serving as Vice-President and President of the Medical Board and was Professor of Dermatology and Head of the Department of New York Medical College until the time he resigned in 1940. In the fall of 1954 Dr. Dearborn was nominated by the Alumni Association and appointed by the Board of Trustees to fill the position of Alumnus Trustee on the Board.

JOSEPH HENRY FOBES

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From 1903-1904 he was Demonstrator in Physiology at New York Medical College; 1904-1906 Assistant Demonstrator in Anatomy: 1906-1910 Lecturer in Surgery; 1910-1921 Assistant Professor of Surgery; 1921-1922 Associate Professor of Surgery; 1922-1928 Director of Gynecology; 1928-1936 Professor of Surgery; 1936-1940 Professor of Surgery and Director of Surgical Service. In 1940 he was appointed Professor and Director of the Department of Graduate Surgery and holds this position at the present time. Dr. Fobes also served as Consultant Surgeon to Jamaica Hospital, Jamaica, N. Y.; Metropolitan and New York Ophthalmic Hospitals, N.Y.C.; St. Mary's Hospital, Passaic, N. J.; Fitkin Memorial Hospital, Neptune, N. J.; Montclair Community and St. Vincent's Hospitals, Montclair, N. J.; Barnert Hospital, Paterson, N. J.; and St. Francis Hospital, Pough-keespie, N. Y.

Dr. Fobes is a member of the following medical societies: Fellow of the A.M.A.; Fellow of the American College of Surgeons serving as Governor 1940-1949; Fellow in General Surgery Section, N. Y. Academy of Medicine: Member of the Surgical, Gynecological and Obstetrical Society of the American Institute of Homeopathy, serving as President in 1919; the New York State Homeopathic Medical Society, President 1923-24; New York County Homeopathic Medical Society, President 1920; New Jersey Homeopathic Medical Society; New York County Medical Society; New York State Medical Society; New York Surgical Society: American Association of University Professors; Alpha Sigma, President 1941 and Alpha Kappa Kappa; Diplomate of the American Board of Surgery, Founder Member; New York Academy of Medicine; Associate Physicans of Montclair and Vicinity; honorary member Connecticut Homeopathic Medical Society; honorary member Albany County, N. Y. Homeopathic Medical Society; member of the Contin Society, the honor society at New York Medical College; and was President of the Society of New York Medical College and Affiliated Hospitals.

Among Dr. Fobes' more social affiliations are the Montclair Golf Club; the U.S. Seniors' Golf Association; the Sons of the American Revolution, N. J. Chapter; the New Jersey Society of Mayflower Descendants, serving as Surgeon General; St. Andrew's Society; Burns Society and the Meissen-Unanimous Clubs.

Dr. Fobes served on the Advisory Council of the New York County Surgical Compensation Qualifying Board; Associate Editor of the Quarterly Review of Surgery and for over fifteen years has been Editor-in-Chief of the Chironian.

Since Dr. Fobes' appointment as Director of Graduate Surgery in 1940, 250 students fell under his guidance. Each and every one of these graduate students keeps in close contact with Dr. Fobes as to his plans and progress and comes to him first for advice. Distance is no object when they wish to consult him. He has students not only in almost every state in the country, but from many countries abroad as well. On his 75th birthday, telegrams, cards, letters, poems, and gifts poured into his office, for all who had him as a teacher wanted him to know he was closest to their hearts on this great day. His interest and concern in assisting the young doctor in any problem, at any time, has made him hundreds of grateful and loyal friends. We are very proud of our Dr. 4 Fobes.

Alumni-College Reception

At the suggestion of Doctor J. A. W. Hetrick, President of the College, the Alumni Association joined with the College in holding a reception in honor of the members of the graduating class on Monday, May 28, the day preceding

graduation.

The first and second floors of the College building were opened for the reception. Punch and cookies were served to background music. by Muzak. Over 600 guests attended the reception, setting a record and proving the success of the affair. A formal program was held in the College auditorium, with a large overflow audience in the College lobby.

Doctor Hetrick offered a formal welcome to the graduates and guests. Doctor Lawrence B. Slobody, president of the Alumni Association, presented a gift to the graduates in behalf of the College and the Alumni Association.

Each graduate was presented with a polished marble paper weight bearing the seal of the College. Ronald J. Pion, president of the graduating class, accepted the gift on behalf of the class and briefly offered a few words of appreciation.

Each year, the Alumni Association is privileged to select outstanding members of the Alumni of the College for a special recognition of their service to the College. This year, there were three such individuals and Doctor Slobody introduced Doctor Frederick H. Dearborn, Doctor Joseph H. Fobes and Doctor Sprague Carleton for an Outstanding Alumnus of the Year Award. Doctor Slobody spoke briefly concerning each of the men, giving an account of their contribution to the College.

By special invitation, the members of the class of 1931 attended the reception. There were 25 members of the class present to receive Silver Certificate Awards from Doctor Ralph E. Snyder, Dean of the College, in recognition of the twenty-fifth anniversary of their graduation. Ronald J. Pion presented the dedication of the Fleur-o-scope, the College Year

Book.

The dedication was made to the late Doctor Clair E. Folsome, Professor and Director of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology—"Gentleman, Scholar, Teacher, Friend." Mrs. Folsome was presented with the first copy of the Year Book.

Doctor John Herrlin, President of the Alumni Fund, spoke briefly about the purposes of the fund and announced the gift of ten thousand dollars to the College by the Alumni Association.

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Commencement

The Ninety-Seventh Commencement ceremony of the New York Medical College, J. A. W. Hetrick, M.D., President, was held at the New York Academy of Medicine on Tuesday, May 29, 1956 with Ralph E. Snyder,

M.D., Dean of the College, presiding.

After the Processional and the Star Spangled Banner, the Invocation was given by the Reverend John Ellis Large, D.D., Rector, Church of the Heavenly Rest. Dean Snyder welcomed the members, friends and relatives of the graduating class and presented Robert A. Moore, M.D., Ph.D., Vice Chancellor, Schools of the Health Professions, University of Pittsburgh, and President of the Association of American Medical College. His subject was "Some Reflections on Responsibility." Dr. Moore stressed the doctor's "expanding responsibility as a citizen in preserving the figurative health of our society." He emphasized the larger responsibility of the medical profession in preserving our system of education, particularly of higher education.

Dean Snyder then gave a short description of Hippocrates and the Hippocratic Oath, and Joseph H. Fobes, M.D., F.A.C.S., Director of the Department of Graduate Surgery, led the class in the administration of the Hippocratic Oath. This was immediately followed by a very impressive rendering of the Lord's Prayer by the

organist and a quartet.

Charles D. Halsey, retiring Chairman of the Board of Trusteees, conferred the Degree of Doctor of Medicine on 108 students. (See listing on back cover).

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DR. LEHR APPOINTED DIRECTOR OF DEPARTMENT OF PHYSIOLOGY AND PHARMACOLOGY



Dr. J. A. W. Hetrick, President of New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals, announced on July 21, 1956 the appointment of Dr. David Lehr as Director of the newly combined Department of Physiology and Pharmacology at the College.

Dr. Lehr is internationally known for his experimental and clinical studies with sulfonamides. These studies resulted in the development of the Sulfonamide Mixture Principle, which consists of the use of partial dosages of several sulfa drugs used in combination to reduce danger to the kidney and other toxic reactions. He was recently made a member of the Poison Control Board of the New York City Health Department.

He left on July 20th for Europe to present a paper at the Twentieth International Physiological Congress in Brussels on his research with experimental arteriosclerosis. During the past six years, he has developed a method of producing severe arteriosclerosis experimentally in rats to study prevention, under grants from the National Heart Institute of the National Institute of Health.

He has published extensively on work with sulfonamides, arteriosclerosis and other subjects, and produced numerous convention exhibits, winning the Certificate of Merit from both the American Medical Association and the Association of Military Surgeons of the United States, as well as First Award for Clinical Research from the Medical Society of the State of New York.

Dr. Lehr was formerly a member of the faculty at the University of Vienna Medical School and at the Royal University of Lund in Sweden. He received his M.D. degree from the University of Vienna Medical School in 1935. He joined the faculty of New York Medical College in 1941 as instructor in Pharmacology and Medicine. For the past two years he has served as Director of the Department of Pharmacology, which will now be combined with the Department of Physiology.

He is Chairman of the Research Committee of the New York Medical College—Metropolitan Medical Center; Associate Attending Physician at Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals, and Visiting Physician at Metropolitan and Bird S. Coler Hospitals, which hospitals are staffed by New York Medical College.

He is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians, the New York Academy of Sciences, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the American College of Cardiology.

His home is in Larchmont, N. Y.

NEW HEAD DEPARTMENT OF OBSTETRICS AND GYNECOLOGY



Dr. Martin L. Stone Appointed Director

On July 1, 1956, Dr. J.A.W. Hetrick, President of New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals, announced the appointment of Dr. Martin L. Stone as Professor and Director of the Department of Obstetrics. and Gynecology.

Dr. Stone, who has achieved a wide reputation in this field of medicine, is a native of New York City. He has contributed extensively to scientific journals, and has addressed meetings of leading medical groups. He is a member of the Special Committee on Infant Mortality of the New York County Medical Society, and has been a member of the faculty of New York Medical College since 1949.

Dr. Stone is a Diplomate of the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology, a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, a founding Fellow of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology, and a Fellow of the New York Academy of Medicine.

A graduate of the DeWitt Clinton High School, he received his B.S. degree from Columbia University in 1941, his M.D. from New York Medical College in 1944, and his Master of Medical Science in Obstetrics and Gynecology from our College in 1949.

NEW MEDICAL HISTORY DEPARTMENT



Dr. Felix Marti-Ibanez Appointed Director

Dr. Felix Marti-Ibanez, medical editor and historian, has been appointed Professor and Director of a newly-created History of Medicine Department at New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals. A museum and library of medical history and historical research is planned as part of the program.

Dr. Marti-Ibanez is widely known as a distinguished teacher, and it is felt that the new department will make a notable contribution to medical education. Dr. Marti-Ibanez is editor of the International Record of Medicine and General Practice Clinics, associate editor of Antibiotics and Chemotherapy and of Antibiotic Medicine, and international editor of the Journal of Clinical and Experimental Psychopathology. He has contributed to American and European journals in the fields of the history of medicine, psychology and psychiatry, and is the recipient of the Order of Carlos J. Finlay of Cuba, awarded to distinguished scientists and science writers.

Born in Cartagena, Spain, he received his medical degree from the University of Madrid. He is now a resident of New York, and has lectured extensively on medical history in the United States. Until 1939 he held the office of Under-Secretary of Public Health of Spain. He is the author of several novels published in Spain, and of short stories and articles on art and literature published in the United States.

A QUARTER OF A CENTURY LATER



A QUARTER OF A CENTURY







IN MEMORIAM

Walter Gray Crump, Jr., M.D., F.A.C.S., died suddenly May 9, 1956 at the age of 55. Graduating from the New York Medical College in 1928, he joined the Department of Surgery in 1929 and became Assistant Clinical Professor in 1950. He was Assistant Attending Surgeon at Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals and Associate Surgeon at Metropolitan Hospital. Dr. Crump was a Fellow of the American Medical Association, Diplomate of the American Board of Surgery, member of the Homeopathic Medical Societies of the State and County of New York, and member of the Columbia University Club, the Alpha Club and the Dunham Club.

He is survived by his widow, Claire Conroy Crump, two daughters, Constance Eudora and Cynthia Crump, and a son, Walter Gray Crump, 3rd, all residing at Darien, Conn.

ZIDE, WILLIAM, N. Y., was born in Poland on January 13, 1899. He attended the College of the City of New York and received his M.D. degree from our College in 1923. He was Assisting Attending Obstetrician and Gynecologist at Maimonides Hospital and Maimonides Hospital Outpatient Department, Brooklyn. Dr. Zide was a member of the Kings County Medical Society, the Medical Society of the State of New York, and the American Medical Association. He was 57 years old when he died of coronary thrombosis on March 27, 1956. He is survived by his wife, Sadie, a son and a daughter.

MEGA, GAETANO T., Brooklyn, N. Y., died on January 29, 1956 of a heart attack at the age of 56. He was a general practioner in Brooklyn for 29 years and served on the staffs of the Kings County Hospital and the Kingsway Hospital. Surviving are his wife, Marie and three sons, Ronald, Paul and Dennis.

HERMES, HARRY L., New York, N. Y., was born in New York City on September 11, 1888. He attended Columbia University, the New York College of Pharmacy, and received his M.D. degree from our College in 1918. He served his internship at Bellevue Hospital and Mary Immaculate Hospital in Jamaica. He was a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons and on the Staff at Metropolitan, Flower and Fifth Avenue, and Misericordia Hospitals. Dr. Hermes died on May 2, 1956 at the age of 67. He is survived by his widow, Edna, a daughter, Viola and a son, Louis.

DAVIS, WILLIAM B., San Bruno, California, passed away on January 7, 1956 in Pasadena, California at the age of 87. Dr. Davis received his Medical Degree from our College in 1893.

DR. CARL NEUBERG

On May 30, Dr. Carl Neuberg died at the age of 78. He had been a member of the Department of Biochemistry since 1950, with the title, "Associate with professional rank."

Dr. Neuberg was known as the discoverer of a process of making glycerin from sugar, which led to the commercial production of nitroglycerin by yeast fermentation. He also was credited with having found the first two enzymes participating in metabolic changes.

It was largely as a result of his research and that of Sir Arthur Harden and Sydney Young of Great Britain that there emerged a clear picture of how the sugar molecule breaks down to produce alcohol and carbon dioxide.

The scientist was born in Hanover, Germany, and received a Ph.D. in chemistry at the University of Berlin in 1900. In 1952 the university awarded him an honorary M.D. He also held other degrees, including an LL.D. from St. Andrews U., Scotland, and honorary degrees from the Universities of Breslau, Palermo, Leningrad, Milan, Rome and Danzig.

Dr. Neuberg lectured at Berlin for many years beginning in 1903. In 1912 he became Director of the Kaiser Wilhelm Institute of Experimental Therapy in Berlin; and later held the same post at the Kaiser Wilhelm Institute for Biochemistry at Dahlem.

Although his services to Germany had been invaluable, both in peacetime and during World War I, Dr. Neuberg was driven out of his native land by the Hitler regime and came to this country in 1940.

For his discovery of the enzyme carboxylase he received the Emil Fischer Medal of the Society of German Chemists and for his original work on the production of nitroglycerine from yeast, the Delbruck Medal, a German award.

The Pasteur, Biochemic, Leblanc, Berzelius and Scheele Medals were among others he won.

In 1906, he founded the first journal devoted exclusively to the biochemical sciences, Biochemische Zietschrift. He was its editor in chief until 1936. He was the author of hundreds of artices on biochemical subjects, his latest paper being scheduled for publication in the next volume of "Advances in Enzymology."

Two weeks before he died he gave a lecture-demonstration in Room A419 of the College. The title was, "Experimental Demonstration of Some Fundamental Biochemical Reactions." This was his "swan song." After the lecture tributes; to Dr. Neuberg were made by Professor Norde of Fordham University and by Professor Ochoa of New York University.
