The Board of

October Meeting

The meeting of the Board of Governors of the Alumni Association of the New York Medical College was called to order at 3:30 P.M., in room 518A of the college on October 2, 1957, by Dr. Walter Mersheimer, President.

PRESENT: Drs. Blankfein, Borrelli, Fierro, Fobes, Hayner, Jewett, Kuntze, Mersheimer, Nagamatsu, Napp, Salzman, Shiner, Silverstein, Slobody, Snyder, Stone, Turtz and Mr. Belskie, college sculptor.

The minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as read.

TREASURY REPORT: There is \$13,059.33 in the treasury.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT: Dr. Napp reported there were 1,269 paid up members to date this year; 1,076 senior members and 196 junior members. He was most optimistic towards reaching his goal of 1,500 for this year.

Dr. Napp further reported that the Chairmen Pro Tem of the Auxiliary Alumni Groups were notified of the meeting; however, none were able to attend. Nevertheless, he anticipates a good showing at the next meeting.

GROUND HOG DAY: Plans are being made for Ground Hog Day to be held in February, 1958. Dr. Borrelli, Chairman, was allocated the same budget (\$750.00) for the affair as last year.

The following motions were proposed and passed:

That Miss Benson, Administrative Assistant to the Alumni Association, receive an increase in salary.

That a committee be appointed by the President to look into the possibilities of a full time Director of Activities for the College, Alumni Association and Alumni Fund.

That in order to expedite discussions at Board meetings, a Program Committee be appointed by the President whose function it will be to plan a projected program of Alumni Association activities for a year or possibly two years ahead.

Mr. Belskie presented in clay the new design for the Alumni Association seal. As the Board felt there were too many dates on the face of

the seal they made the following changes: The incorporation date of the association and the founding date of the college should be deleted and only the founding date, 1883, of the association remain. With this proviso a motion was passed that \$250.00 be expended to have a die-cut of the seal made. Mr. Belskie donated his services to the Association for the sculpture work involved.

Dr. Mersheimer brought before the Board the question of class secretaries and by which method they should be selected. It was the feeling of the entire Board that they be chosen by their respective class. Further discussion of this question was tabled to the next meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 4:45 P.M.

November Meeting

The meeting of the Board of Governors of the Alumni Association of the New York Medical College was called to order at 3:30 P.M., in room 518A of the college on November 13, 1957, by Dr. Walter Mersheimer, President.

PRESENT: Drs. Annitto, Blankfein, Borrelli, Carleton, Einhorn, Firtel, Fierro, Hayner, Jewett, Lillick Mersheimer, Napp, Salzman, Silverstein, Slobody, Snyder, Stone, Wershub and Mr. Lincoln, Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

TREASURY REPORT: There is \$13,089.66 in the treasury.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT: There are 1,368 paid up members to date this year; 1,149 senior members and 219 junior members. Dr. Mersheimer recommended Dr. Arthur V. Jensen, Assistant Dean, for Associate Membership. The Board unanimously voted for his acceptance.

The President asked Dr. Hayner, Chairman of the newly formed Reorganization and Planning Committee for a preliminary report. (Drs. Herrlin, Napp and Stone serve on the committee). Dr. Hayner read his report (copy follows) and the following discussion ensued:

Re: #1—Dr. Snyder suggested that instead of planning the first Alumni Auxiliary Groups

in Florida and the West Coast, areas closer to the Medical College should be considered. Dr. Blankfein, Chairman of the Alumni Auxiliary Groups, stated that local groups have already been started.

Re: #4—Dr. Snyder answered the question as to the monies coming into the Institution. Most of the money received from foundations has been for restricted purposes, mostly research. Other than the \$100,000.00 received from the Ford Foundation, of which only the interest can be used for ten years, there have been no other sizable donations. Dr. Snyder added that the endowments have increased by \$1,000,000.00. He felt that a number of other foundations may be approached.

Re: #5—As the actual status and selection of the Alumnus Trustee was vague to the Board, Mr. Lincoln offered to discuss the question with the Board of Trustees at its next meeting and report back to the Board of Governors.

Re: #7—Mr. Lincoln reported that within six months the bulk of the Alumni pledges in the Building and Development Fund will have expired. He will bring to the Board a report on the status of the Fund. Dr. Snyder stated that for an Alumni Fund to be successful, it would require at least six months of preparation. There should be no delay in starting an Alumni Fund Campaign.

There being no further discussion on the report of the Reorganization and Planning Committee, it was unanimously passed by the Board.

The Women's Auxiliary of the Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospital asked that the Alumni Association co-sponsor their forthcoming dinner-dance. The Board passed the following motion: That the Alumni Association be a co-sponsor of the coming dinner-dance of the Women's Auxiliary.

December 11, 1957 was selected for the next meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 4:50 P.M.

Dr. Hayner's Report

The Reorganization and Planning Committee of the Alumni Association met on Monday, November 4, 1957 at 3:30 P.M., in Dr. Hayner's office in the college.

Present were Drs. Herrlin, Napp, Stone and Chairman, Dr. Hayner.

The committee unanimously voted upon the following recommendations:

1. We approve in principle the appointment of a Director of Activities and add that he should be provided with an appropriate office and other facilities. However, final approval will have to await the determination and allocation of costs.
2. Whereas, the formation of Auxiliary Alumni Groups is important for the growth of our organization, we recommend that at this time two specific targets be started: namely the Florida and West Coast areas.
3. In order that business more important to the association and college than simple routine matters may receive adequate attention by the Board of Governors at its meetings, we recommend that standing committee reports be briefer, and even omitted at Board meetings except immediately prior to the annual meeting.
4. In order for the Alumni Association to be properly effective in advancing the interests of the College, we consider it necessary that the association have more knowledge of the current status and problems of the College and of its plans for the future.
5. We are dissatisfied with the past and present status of the Alumni Trustees, and are convinced that they should be persons available at, and directed to attend meetings of the Board of Governors, as well as those of the Board of Trustees, so that they can participate more actively in liaison.
6. We recommend appointment of a committee to arrange a full day of alumni activity at the college in addition to our standard Alumni Day. Visiting alumni should be invited to be active participants in such alumni and college activities.
7. The Alumni Fund should be promptly reinstated on an annual basis.

DR. BOYD TO HEAD NEW DIVISION

As part of the ten-year development program at New York Medical College, Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals, the Postgraduate Division will be expanded to enable practicing physicians to continue their education with a schedule adapted to meet their office hours, Dean Ralph E. Snyder announced. The first step in this enlarged program was the appointment of Dr. Linn J. Boyd as Director of the Division of Graduate Studies simultaneously announced by Dean Snyder. Dr. Boyd has been Director of the Department of Medicine for thirty years.

"We plan to tailor the program of the school to meet the needs of the practicing physician, instead of requiring him to change his schedule to meet the program of the school," Dr. Snyder said. "This is an important new approach to postgraduate study which will enable the busy physician to keep abreast of the latest developments in the rapidly changing field of science. Classes at night and separate courses to be taught in the various boroughs close to the physician's own home or office will be phases of the new development planned to start during the summer months."

Dr. Boyd, who will head the Division of Graduate Studies, was graduated from the University of Michigan Medical School, where he taught for six years. He is widely known for his publications in scientific journals on cardiology and electro-cardiography, and his two

11 SAVED FROM GAS BY INTERN'S CALL

Eleven occupants of a Brooklyn apartment house were saved from almost certain death by carbon monoxide poisoning on November 15th through the alertness of Dr. Jerry Weisfogel.


Dr. Weisfogel was on duty in the emergency ward of Beth-El Hospital, Brooklyn, N.Y., when Louis Ortez, 28 years old, his wife and their two children, Louis, 5, and Eloise 5 weeks, staggered in. He noted that all the Ortezes were suffering from nausea, headaches and dizziness—common symptoms of food poisoning. He examined further and diagnosed gas poisoning.

The intern then asked where the Ortez family lived and immediately telephoned the Health Department. Minutes later, Chief Field Supervisor, Epifanio Sineno and Michael Terpilak of the department's Gas Poisoning and Control Unit were at the four-story building. Even without instruments, they could detect the fumes. They quickly found the source—a broken connection in the flue leading from the coal furnace in the basement. They put out the fire, opened windows and rushed to the unsuspecting tenants.

Affected were three women, six children and two men. The fumes had made them sleepy, but some were quickly revived by fresh air. An expectant mother, almost unconscious, was rushed to Beth-El in the emergency car. The tenants who had to be hospitalized were reported in good condition.

The quick witted action by Dr. Weisfogel drew praise from Dr. Roscoe P. Kandle, First

It is indeed a pleasure for us to particularly commend Dr. Jerry Weisfogel with respect to his diagnosis and acumen in suspecting carbon monoxide poisoning on November 15. Dr. Weisfogel made a good differential diagnosis and called the Health Department for an investigation of the premises from which the patients had come. Our staff responded immediately and the combined efforts of them and Dr. Weisfogel were instrumental in saving the lives of possibly eleven people. The premises were found to have a high concentration of carbon monoxide due to a breakdown in the furnace.
