TO DELIVER TWO LECTURES

JOSEPH G. LOWIN, Associate Professor and Chairman of the Department of Languages and Literatures is scheduled to deliver two off-campus lectures this spring. In April, he will read a paper entitled "Peripheral Vision in Apollinaire's L'Heresiar-que et Cie" at the Convention of the Northeast Modern Language Association in Pittsburgh, Pa. An expanded version of this essay is to be published in French next year in the Revue des Lettres Modernes. In late May, Prof. Lowin will read a paper "The Dream-Frame in Gautier's Contes fantastiques" at a Colloquium in Nineteenth Century French Studies at the University of Maine in Orono.

ESSAY PUBLISHED

A short essay by GARY Wurtzel, Instructor in Communications and Sociology, will appear in the Spring 1977 edition of ETC., The Journal for the Society for General Semantics. The essay deals with a new approach to semiotic theory set forth by French anthropoligist Dan Sperber in a major work on symbolism and culture. Mr. Wurtzel's essay attempts to carry through a number of unarticulated implications in Sperber's theory related to "Media and Symbolism," the theme of this edition of ETC.
