Honorary Degrees awarded to Senator Jacob K. Javits, Dr. Stephen P. Jewett, Dr. Israel S. Kleiner.



The Honorable George Link, Jr., Vice-Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees, presented the William Cullen Bryant Award to James Murray and the Conrad Engerud Tharaldsen Award to Harry Locke, respectively, for the highest scholastic achievement.

Gold diplomas were then awarded to James R. Bramley, Edwin C. Braynard, David B. Hill, Stephen P. Jewett, Julius T. Kane, Cyrenius A. Newcomb, Clyde Overton, Frank M. Wright, and Hugh M. White of the 50 year class.

Following the commencement exercises, a reception honoring the graduating class was held at the College.

The New York Academy of Medicine was the scene of the 101st Commencement Exercises of New York Medical College, on Tuesday, June 7, 1960.

Following the invocation, Dr. Ralph E. Snyder, President and Dean, introduced the Honorable Jacob K. Javits, United States Senator, who delivered the commencement address—"Medical Care and the Private Economy."

Dr. Joseph H. Fobes, Professor of Graduate Surgery, administered the Hippocratic Oath after which degrees were conferred upon the graduating class by Frederic W. Lincoln, Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

Representing the class of 1910 were Drs. James

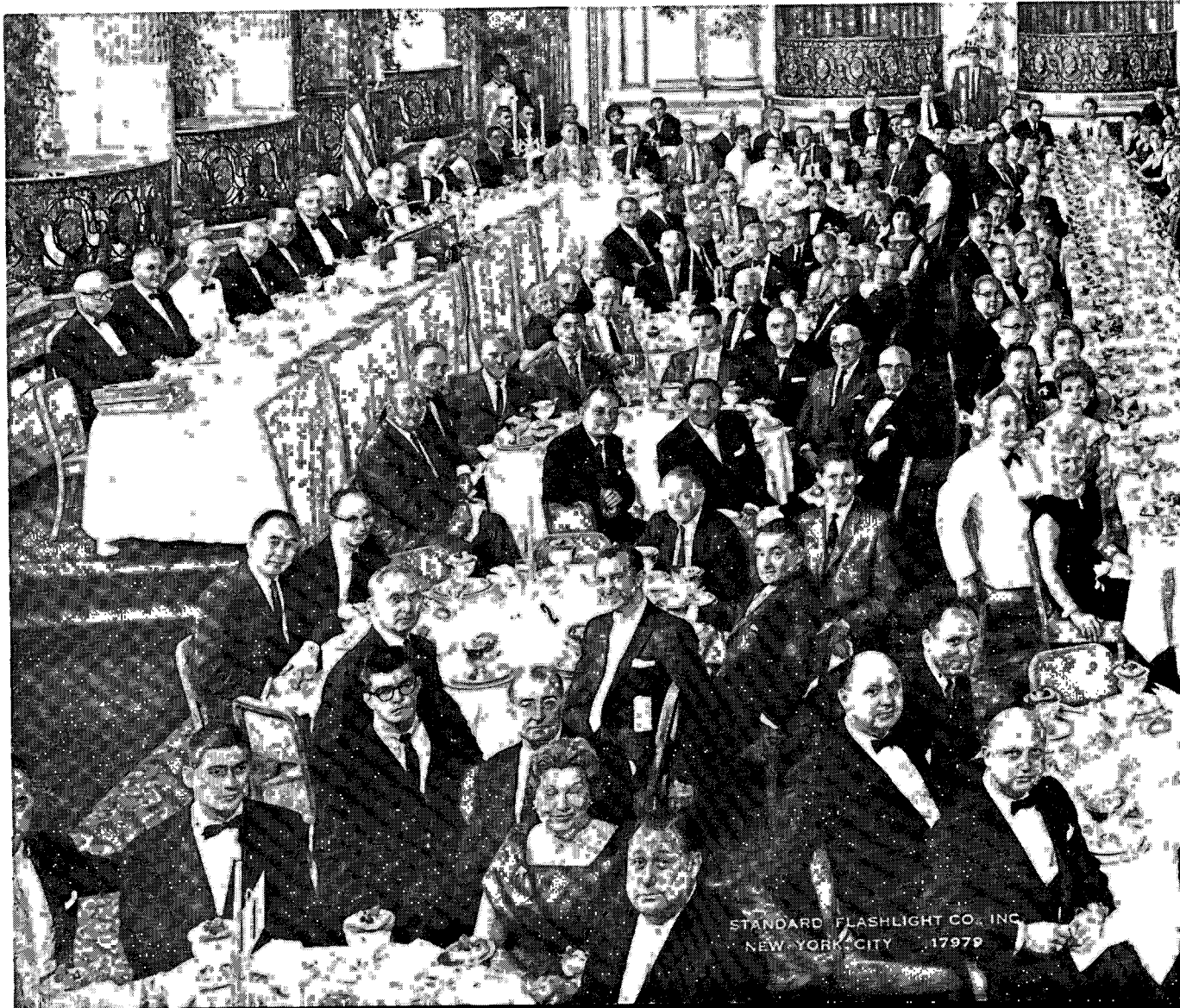

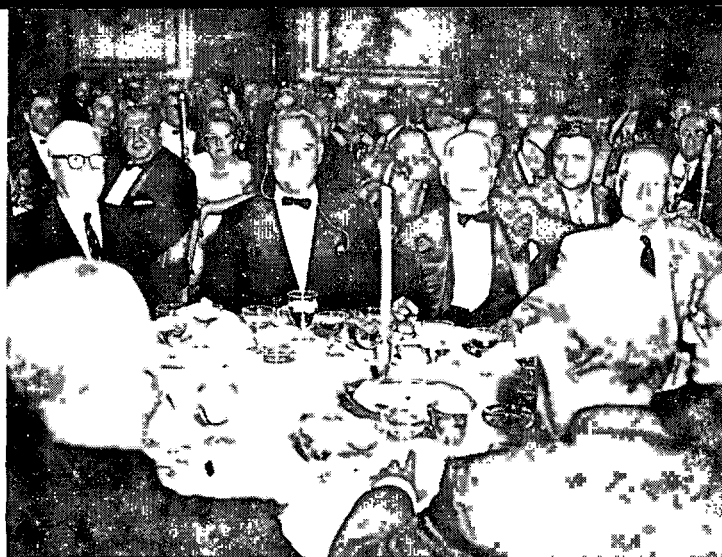
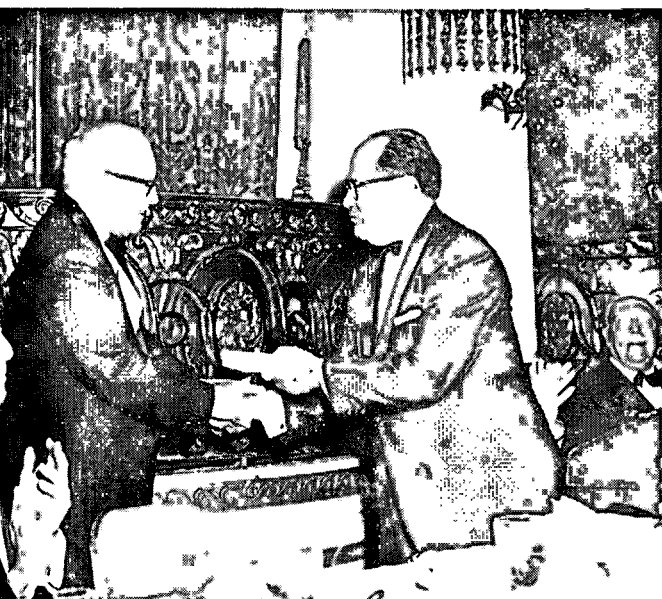

DR. DOBBINS, 'NAUTILUS' MEDICAL OFFICER, PROMOTED

Dr. Richard F. Dobbins '45, the medical officer of the *USS NAUTILUS* on her maiden voyage under the polar icecap in August, 1958, has been promoted to Captain.

Dr. Dobbins has spent the last five of the ten years he has been in the Navy in the atomic submarine program, including three years aboard the *Nautilus*, the world's first nuclear powered sub. He will serve with the Navy's Bureau of Medicine and Surgery in Washington, D. C.

DR. FREEDMAN APPOINTED PROFESSOR AND CHAIRMAN OF DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHIATRY



Dr. Alfred M. Freedman was recently appointed professor and chairman of the department of psychiatry at New York Medical College.

In the past, Dr. Freedman served as clinical instructor in psychiatry at the New York University College of Medicine, psychiatric director of the League for Seriously Emotionally Disturbed Children, assistant in psychiatry at University Hospital, and senior psychiatrist of the Child Psychiatry Service of Bellevue Hospital. He has also served on several scientific panels dealing with the emotional problems of physically handicapped children and childhood schizophrenia. He is a member of the National Advisory Committee of the League for Emotionally Disturbed Children, and was a delegate of the American Psychiatric Association to the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth in Washington, D. C. Dr. Freedman is the author of numerous scientific papers.

Born in 1917 in Albany, New York, Dr. Freedman received his medical degree from the University of Minnesota Medical School. Dr. Freedman is married and is the father of two sons.

**DR. PIGMAN APPOINTED
PROFESSOR AND CHAIRMAN
OF DEPARTMENT OF BIOCHEMISTRY**



Dr. Ward Pigman has been appointed professor and chairman of the Department of Biochemistry. He has replaced Dr. Israel Kleiner who retired after serving New York Medical College for many years.

Dr. Pigman has been an associate professor of biochemistry at the University of Alabama Medical College since 1949. He is a consultant for the National Institute of Health, United States Navy, National Research Council, and is the inventor of "Niagara" starch, and the artificial mouth used for simulation of conditions in the mouth. In 1959 he was the recipient of the S. S. Hudson Award of the American Chemical Society. He is the author of about two hundred scientific and review papers, editor of Volumes I to V of *Advance in Carbohydrate Chemistry* and member of the executive committee for subsequent volumes. He is past chairman of the Division of Carbohydrate Chemistry of the American Chemical Society.

Dr. Pigman, born in 1910, in Chicago, received his Bachelor of Science degree and Master of Arts degree from George Washington University. He received his Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Maryland and was also a Lalor Fellow at the University of Leipzig, in Germany.

**DR. WAGNER APPOINTED
PROFESSOR AND CHAIRMAN
OF DEPARTMENT OF PATHOLOGY**



President Snyder recently announced the appointment of Dr. Bernard M. Wagner as professor and chairman of the Department of Pathology at New York Medical College. Dr. Wagner will also serve as director of the department of pathology at the college's Flower and Fifth Avenue Hospitals and at Metropolitan Hospital. Previously, Dr. Wagner was associate professor of pathology and Robert L. King Professor for cardiovascular research at the University of Washington School of Medicine.

From 1956 to 1958, Dr. Wagner served as assistant professor of pathology at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine and director of pathology at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. The recipient of numerous research grants from both government and private foundation sources, Dr. Wagner is the author of more than 50 published scientific papers; he has also delivered more than 25 papers before scientific bodies in the United States, England, and Scotland. Dr. Wagner is a member of the American Society for Experimental Pathology, American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the American Association of Pathologists and Bacteriologists.

Born in 1928, in Philadelphia, Dr. Wagner is an alumnus of Hahnemann Medical College.
