128 Graduate at 1994 Commencement Exercises

Touro College's School of Health Sciences will confer 126 degrees on graduates at the school's 1994 commencement exercises which will be held this year on Thursday night, September 8th, at 7 P.M., at Huntington High School in Huntington, Long Island.

Forty-seven students will receive their B.S./MA degrees from the Physical Therapy Program. Touro's Outreach To The Community





Anne-Marie Bozzarelli, RPA-Cwasrecently appointed Director of Touro's Health Sciences School's Physician Assistant Program.

Anne-Marie, always interested in the medical field, attended the College of Staten Island where she received a B.S. degree in Medical Technology.

She worked in a laboratory setting for a number of years as a Medical Technologist but always had a strong desire to have a more active role in direct patient care. Encouraged by physicians to pursue a career as a Physician Assistant, she applied to Long Island University's Physician Assistant Program, in 1984. In June, 1986, she graduated from the Program and was honored with the Wallace Award for the Ideal P.A. Her first role as a Physician Assistant was in Coney Island Hospital in the Department of Surgery, her responsibilities included all aspects of patient care as well as serving as an active member of the trauma team.

In September, 1991, a Physician Assistant Department was established at Coney Island Hospital and she was appointed the Director. Her responsibilities included the overseeing and administering of all Physician Assistants employed at the hospital in conjunction with their respective department heads in both inpatient and outpatient settings. As Director, she also organized and arranged student clinical rotations at the Institution.

In December of that year, the Coney Island Medical Group's P.A. Program entered into an affiliation with Touro College and she was appointed Associate Director. Her responsibilities included the planning and development of the Coney Island Extension Center, day to day operation of the campus and teaching in the didactic year, as well as serving on the admissions Curriculum and Academic Progress Committees.

In April 1994, she was appointed Director of Touro's School of Health Sciences Physician Assistant Program and assumed responsibilities for the entire program, both in Dix Hills and at the Coney Island Extension Center.

IMBERS is a division of the Center for Health Education and Research in Rehabilitation at Touro College.

The multidisciplinary biomedical "think-tank" is concerned with the study of the quality of human life in all of its ramifications. In particular, the Institute has been actively investigating human nervous system function from a multidisciplinary perspective with applications for alternatives in health care, neuroscience, rehabilitation, developmental disabilities and genetic disorders, with product development supporting these missions. IMBERS has a philosophical bent towards better understanding of the concept "wellness."

We presently offer postgraduate programs in Clinical Engineering with a spe-

cial focus in retraining displaced defense workers. We anticipate, in the future, to be able to offer doctoral level programs in Clinical Engineering and Clinical Vocational Rehabilitative Neuropsychology. Our Institute consists of a community of scientists in the fields of Clinical Psychophysiology, Neuroanatomy, Physics, Neuroscience, Neurocybernetics and Computer Science, Medicine, Genetics, Metabolism and Nutrition, Cognitive and Neuropsychology, Biomedical Engineering, Neurosurgery, Electrophysiology and Computer and Imaging Sciences.

Patents have been issued to our faculty in fundamentally new technologies in applications of fields of high temperature superconductivity, diamagnetic colloids, thermal anesthesia, thermology, apnea monitoring, among other areas. The patents in high temperature superconductors are seminal and have claims that cover almost every biomedical and industrial application.

The Advanced Masters in Orthopedic **Physical** Therapy

It is with great pleasure and pride that we are able to share with you the advent of the new Master of Arts in Orthopedic Physical Therapy at the Touro College School of Health Sciences. This is a graduate program leading to an advanced degree for licensed Physical Therapists who wish to further their education in the area of Orthopedics.

The Program has a unique design. In addition to the traditional academic approach, many of the courses will have a format similar to the model used by professional continuing education courses. This will enable Touro College to utilize internationally recognized experts in the field of Orthopedic Physical Therapy as faculty. It will also allow the working Physical Therapist a more practical way to complete an advance masters degree.

The program requires 36 credits of course work and is designed to be completed within a minimum of two to three years. However, interested applicants can also take specific courses offerings on a non-matriculation or continuing education basis. The commencement date for the program has arrived and our first class is scheduled for October 1994.

It is an exciting time for all of us involved in making this program happen and we are confident of its success. Our goal is to have a course of study that is dynamic and innovative.

In September 1993, the School of Sciences admitted the first students into our new Pre-Health Sciences Program.

High School graduates can now enter the School as freshmen and complete all the required course work for admission to the Upper Division and other allied health programs. Each of the four programs are tailor-made for students to complete the prerequisite courses for the Upper Division program of their choice.

The program is administered by Professor Michael Kossove, a microbiologist, who is also a member of the faculty of both the Physician Assistant and Health Information Management Programs. Mrs. Sally LeValle, who was the Director of the School of General Studies program, is the Administrative Assistant. Irwin Manzer, who has extensive teaching and administrative experience with the New York City Board of Education, is the Academic Advisor of the program as well as an instructor in history.

The program also administers those students who began their studies at Dix Hills in a satellite program for the School of General Studies in New YorkCity. These students, most of whom are employees at a New York State facility, adapted their programs for admission to the Health Information Management Program.

The program offers small classes, counseling and advisement, and a faculty of professionals who are teachers. The students find a family environment in the program.


