Touro College was privileged to receive the extremely valuable Judaica and Hebraica collection of the late Rabbi Dr. Sidney B. Hoenig, a well-known historian, rabbinic scholar, authority on the Dead Sea Scrolls, and activist in the field of Jewish education. both of children and adults.

This 3,500 volume collection was donated by Rabbi Dr. Hoenig's son-in-law, Dr. Ira Bader. It includes medieval and modern commentaries on the Bible, festschriften, rabbinics, works on Jewish history. materials in support of Jewish education programs, and serials, journals, and pamphlets.

The Hoenig collection is certainly eclectic; it reflects the erudition and broad interests of Rabbi Dr. Sidney B. Hoenig, as well as his faithfulness to the teachings of the Jewish heritage and tradition.

Midwood Facility

About the Midwood Collection

The Midwood Library, housed in the new facility at Avenue J since March 1995, has been significantly augmented in the following subject areas: education, psychology, the biological sciences, literature, and Judaica. Its extensive business collection has been updated; the study notes and examination preparation manuals for the actuarial program are the most current.

In addition to the new books in the sciences which were acquired by the Library, the valuable gift of the Wischnitzer biomedical collection further supports the Health Sciences program. The Wishnitzer collection consists of several hundred volumes in the subject areas of physiology, anatomy, pathology, genetics, and tissue, cellular, and molecular biology. This collection was reviewed by the Science Department of Touro College.

The speech pathology collection is being augmented in accordance with the guidelines of the Brandon/Hill "Selected List of Books and Journals in the Allied Health Sciences."

Hundreds of literary classics have been added to the Library, including one hundred *Norton Critical Editions* of literary masterpieces, which contain the authoritative texts, notes on background materials and sources, and critical essays.

The Tolkin collection of Judaica classics in translation has certainly enriched our Library. We now have the Soncino translations of the Mishnah and Talmud; the Yale Judaica series, consisting of translations of the Midrash, the Code of Maimonides, and other classics; the Shiff Library of Jewish classics, consisting of translations of Hebrew poetry, philosophy, and miscellaneous significant works of Hebrew and Aramaic literature.

The Midwood Facility Library also received the fine collection of one hundred fifty monographs from Dr. Barry Panzer, a psychotherapist. Included are works on group psychotherapy, neuro-diagnosis in psychotherapy, child psychiatry, research on the effects of television on children, autism, and mental retardation.

Browsing is a common pastime among many library users. Now, with the availability of the Internet, the possibilities for browsing in cyberspace are endless. Not only can electronic publications, newsletters, and online versions of popular newsstand magazines be read and downloaded, but information, sound, and graphics from government agencies, private companies, art museums, and more can be had free.

REFERRALS, LOANS, ALTERNATIVES

When you locate references to materials not available at your Touro Library, talk to your Librarian. S/he can get on the Internet, search online library catalogs, and tell you where items are located.

If you need materials immediately, your Librarian may be able to refer you to a nearby public library. If you need items or resources on a specific subject not available at a public library, your Librarian may be able to refer you to a METRO member library. METRO's members total 255 and include most academic and research libraries in the five boroughs.

In lieu of a referral, your Librarian will most likely be able to obtain materials for you by using interlibrary loan. However, make your requests well in advance of need since it often takes as long as two weeks for items to arrive. If you are in a real hurry, have a major credit card, and wish to have materials mailed or faxed directly to you, you can order them while searching *CARL* and *FirstSearch*.

METRO GRANT

In January, the Touro College Libraries received a Cooperative Collection Development Allotment from METRO, the New York Metropolitan Reference and Research Library Agency. The award of \$12,305 is being used to purchase books in the following areas: microbiology, public finance, computer science, management information science, special education, business administration, speech pathology, occupational therapy, and school psychology. These areas were determined by our Chief Librarians: Chaya Drillman, Bashe Simon, and Timothy V Johnson.

FirstSearch

In our continuing effort to provide our faculty and students with innovative and in-depth research tools, the Touro College Libraries have acquired FirstSearch, which has been up and running since January. FirstSearch is an electronic information system that provides online access to general and specialized databases, such as Biography Index, Readers' Guide to Periodical Literature, ABI/INFORM, and MEDLINE. It also includes the world's largest computerized card catalog, WorldCat (the OCLC Online Union Catalog), where one can access more than 32 million bibliographic records representing the holdings of 20,000 libraries. With FirstSearch you will find references to books, journals, films, computer software, and other materials on any given subject.

Librarians are specialists trained to assist clients in the selection of relevant databases, the formulation of search strategies, and the retrieval of information. We are excited about the scope and depth of *FirstSearch*. By opening up the world of online information to the College community, we believe that *FirstSearch* is an excellent way to enhance learning and facilitate the research process.

NOTES TO FACULTY

Remember to forward your required and recommended reading lists for the summer and fall semesters to your site Librarian. (See the Directory of Libraries on the back page.) It takes at least six weeks for materials to arrive once a purchase order leaves Touro, so we need your timely input to be ready for students when classes begin.

Contact your site Librarian to schedule an instruction session at which our resources and services can be demonstrated to students. Your site Librarian is prepared to work with you to integrate library resources and services into your curriculum.
