## THE PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

## 4 Questions for Dr. Bernard Lander

As one of the nation's longest-serving University Presidents and Jewish leaders, what do you see as the direction of higher learning in the Jewish community?

The American Jewish community is bifurcated by two contradictory vortices — centrifugal and centripetal. While the Jewish community is beset by increasing intermarriages, assimilation and secularization, the number of religiously



committed Jews is dramatically increasing. Consequently, the number of young men and women committed to the academic programs which Touro espouses is also increasing each year. I believe, therefore, that Touro and similar institutions of Jewish and general higher learning have a very promising future.


## Touro College is now entering its fourth decade.

Where do you see it heading?

The original vision of Touro was the establishment of a national and international institution of high quality both in Jewish and general studies. The implementation of this vision is being realized. Touro is already binational and international. As our base in New York broadens and strengthens, our ability to reach unreached Jewish communities in other parts of the United States and abroad will increase. I foresee Touro Colleges soon being developed in other major Jewish communities in the United States, as well as the birth of a European Jewish university associated with Touro and deeply engaged within the Jewish community.

#### What role can the Alumni play in this growth?

As in most American colleges and universities, the alumni should play vital roles in two major areas: fundraising and public relations, which of course includes image building. As committed benefactors of most American institutions of higher learning, alumni are the major contributors to their endowments, thus giving them stability and the ability to grow, appoint faculties of renown and conduct research of significance. School . Subsequently, she enjoyed a successful career as an associate at the law firm of Weil, Gotshal, and Manges, and co-authored *Consumers' Report - Guide to Income Tax Preparation*. She is also a graduate of Torah Academy for Girls and Machon Sara Schneirer (BJJ).

Previously a visiting instructor at Montclair State University, she joined Touro College as an associate professor, where she has been teaching tax law and accounting for eleven years. She and her husband, Rabbi Dr. Richard Ehrlich, the principal of Jewish Foundation School in Staten Island, are raising five daughters in Passaic, N. J., where she is treasurer and an active member of the Chevra Kadisha.

#### MIDDLE STATES SELF STUDY NEEDS ALUMNI INVOLVEMENT

In March, Touro College will launch a major institutional self-study for reaccredidation by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education. The visit is scheduled for Spring 2004.

Dean of Students Robert Goldschmidt, chairing the college's self-study steering committee for the third consecutive time, said "All constituencies of the college-faculty, administration, students, alumni, and trustees - will be involved in the process. At the same time, I hope to continue the school's tradition of educating our students in a warm, caring environment where professors develop mentoring relationships with each student.

#### Q. What is your philosophy of teaching?

**A.** I believe in challenging my students so that they will be able to achieve their career and educational goals. I also strive to develop close personal relationships with them and enjoy sharing in their personal and professional success.

#### Q. Do you see yourself as a role model for our women students?

**A.** I think I can serve as a role model for the Touro women in two areas. The obvious way is that I established a career for myself as an attorney in one of the premier law firms in Manhattan without compromising my religious principles or observance. For example, not only was I the only woman in the firm who wore a sheitl, but every afternoon I set aside time and closed the door to my office to daven mincha.

On a more subtle level, my career reflects the flexibility that women in general and Orthodox women in particular must juggle... different demands. My initial career was as an accountant in the accounting firm of Hecht & Co., and when I wanted to further challenge myself I returned to study law. Even though I loved the practice of law, I always put my family as my first priority and when the demands of my career unduly interfered with my family life, I left the practice of law. However, even when family demands limit career choices, they do not have to terminate them. {Thus} I entered academia, combining my previous professions in a more flexible environment. This allowed me to increase my professional responsibilities and take on the position of dean.
