
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Almost Heaven

Political Science

Being an infant dominion, Touro College pursued a purely domestic policy in its initial year of existence. As it grew in size, Touro began to cultivate and ultimately pursue foreign policy goals.

(1) possesion goals, and (2) milieu goals. Possesion goals entailed the increase or maintenance of possesions. Among these tangible objects were territory and tariff preferences. With the acquisition of the Apex and P.A. programs, Touro furthered its imperialistic goals beyond even its wildest dreams, An impasse was reached, however, at the time of the imposition of the Elevator Tariff. Roberto Navarro headed a student uprising which culminated in the infamous Touro Tea Party. The tariff was removed. Once again, justice had prevailed.

Accounting

Touro College, accountingly speaking, operates under an interesting production concept. It has adopted a system aimed at maximizing scholarship in the long run, and minimizing student apathy in the short run. It sales are in terms of knowledge and its net income, after all expenses, is a cultured man ready to enter the business of life.

In the debit column of the Touro balance sheet we find both long term and short term assets. The small class inventory still exists, if only because of a change of accounting methods which increases the cutoff point for small class consideration. The Administration blames this on inflation and the economic situation in general. We hope that the Board of Directors. decides to reclassify this account, shifting it to the long term asset section. Perhaps more than any account, the small class inventory differentiates the Touro general ledger from that of any other institution.

As of now, our market value has risen way above our par value. Analysts tell us that our stock will skyrocket when we are accredited.

A Voice From The Past

It is not often that reviewer gets to see a royally published report of recent events that gives such a revealing and human picture of the personal lives of the King and his court. For this Mordecai is to be commended. This tale of the great dispute recently concluded in our fair city could, however, be more. strikingly told. This might, of course, been at the expense of some of the accuracy which the author appears to be striving for. The accuracy makes the book little more than a synopsis of the various newspapers headlines from the past year or so.

Its saving grace is the intimate, and often erotic details into which it goes regarding life in the Palace. This gives the book great public appeal, which will probably put it on the best-seller list. This is, all in all, a good book and one that may be around for a few years.
