### UNDER THE GUN

The Second Amendment of the US Constitution provides, "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed." Does this deceptively simple language confer an individual right, or only apply to the National Guard? Second Amendment scholar Stephen P. Halbrook and Law Center Professor Andrew Herz headline the Federalist Society's program on the Constitutional Right to Bear Arms, Tuesday February 15, at 4 PM in the AUD. Mr. Halbrook, author of "That Every Man Be Armed, The Evolution of a Constitution Right", will argue that the Second Amendment creates an individual right fundamental to our Constitutional system. Professor Herz will present a critical analysis of Mr. Halbrook's position.

**New York Bar Exam - July 26 & 27, 1994** Applications will be available for the July 1994 NYS Bar Exam in early April (a notice will be posted in the Registrar's window when they are available). Applications **MUST** be filed between April 27 and May 27, 1994.

**New Jersey Bar Exam - July 27 & 28, 1994.** Between February 1 and April 30, 1994, you must file a written letter stating that you intend to take the Bar Exam. Send this notice to: Secretary, Board of Bar Examiners, CN 973, Trenton, NJ 08625. You are strongly urged to send the Notice of Intention by certified mail. On receipt of a written Notice of Intent, the Board will send each candidate a packet of application forms and instructions with a specified due date to complete and return the forms.

**Pennsylvania Bar Exam - July 26 & 27, 1994.** To obtain an application, please contact: Pennsylvania Board of Law Examiners, Public Ledger Building, Suite 674, 620 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, PA 19106-3466; (215) 627-3246. Applications should be filed by March 21, 1994. Applications will be accepted with a late filing fee of \$100 up until May 11, 1994.
