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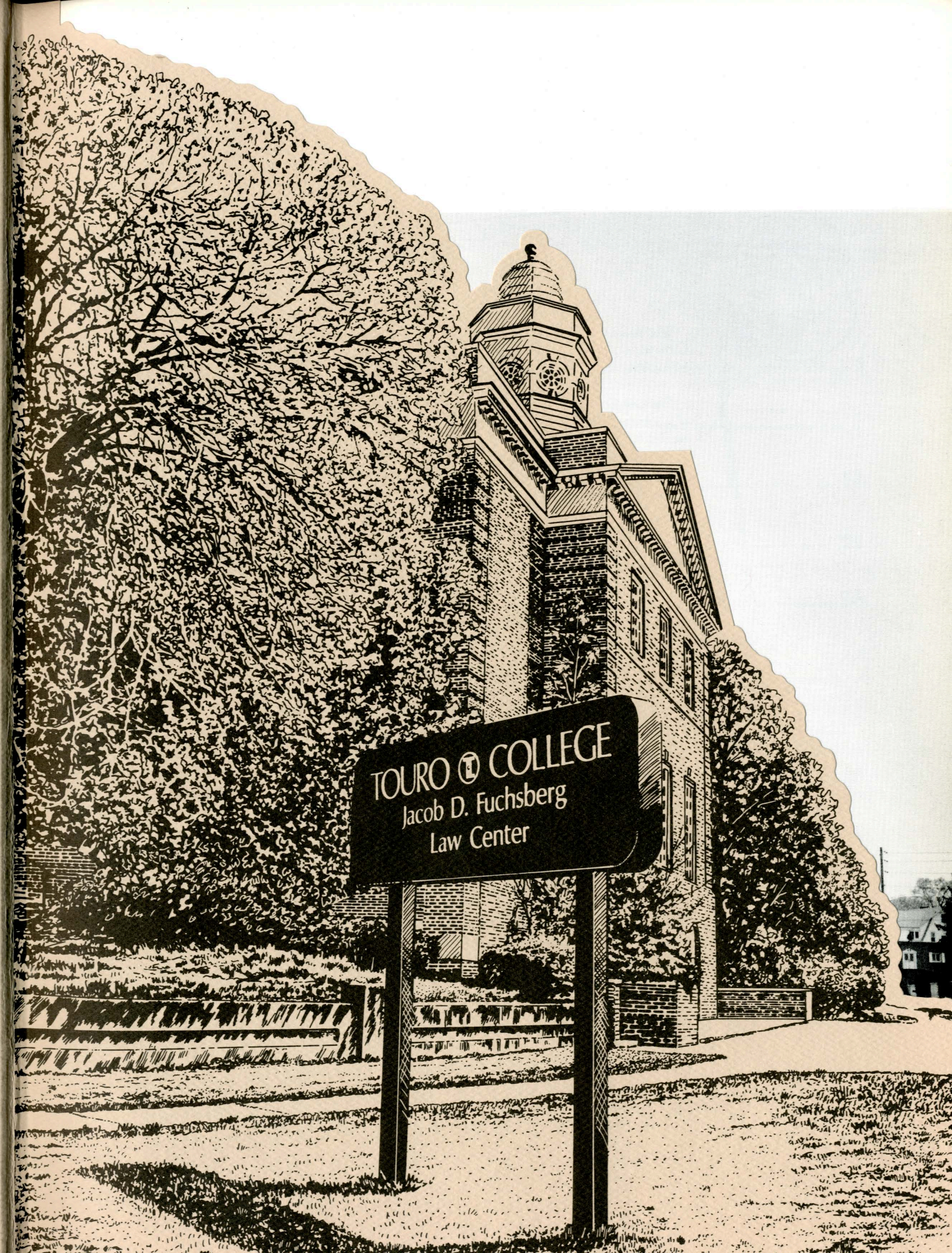



History and Purpose of the School of Law



The Touro College Jacob D. Fuchsberg Law Center is one of the fastest developing law schools in the nation. It has full American Bar Association accreditation with over 800 students and over 50 full-time and adjunct faculty members with a wide range of impressive credentials.

The Law Center is the only law school in Suffolk County, New York, and enjoys the benefits of a suburban location in close proximity to New York City. The Law Center's location has enabled it to provide legal talent to private law offices, government agencies, public prosecutors' and defenders' offices, and corporate offices throughout the New York metropolitan area. Many Law Center graduates have participated in internships and clinical programs in a variety of legal settings in New York.

The College derives its name from Judah and Isaac Touro, leaders of colonial America who represented the ideals upon which the College bases its mission. Inspired by the democratic ethos enunciated by George Washington at Newport, Rhode Island when he visited Touro Synagogue in 1790, the Touro family provided major endowments for universities, the first free library on this continent, community health facilities in the United States, and pioneer settlements in Israel.

Touro College was Chartered by New York State in 1970 and opened in 1971. In the Fall of 1980 the Law School opened at the principal campus of Touro College in Manhattan. Because of the need for more space for the expanding classes and rapidly developing library, a branch campus was established for the law school in Huntington, Long Island, during the summer of 1982. On April 3, 1986 the Jacob D. Fuchsberg Law Center was established in recognition of the commitment, dedication and leadership of Judge Fuchsberg in the establishment, growth and development of the Law Center. The Law Center was granted full accreditation by the House of Delegates of the American Bar Association at its meeting on August 9, 1989. Today, all classes in the J.D. program are located in Huntington.

Two fundamental principles guide the Law Center: to be a relatively small school at the highest intellectual level and to require that students' academic work be rigorous and jurisprudential in nature. The latter emphasizes the need for a grounding in the theory of law if one is to be a professional rather than a reciter of the dated rules. In response to these principles, the Law Center seeks to develop professionals for law or law related careers in any common law jurisdiction.

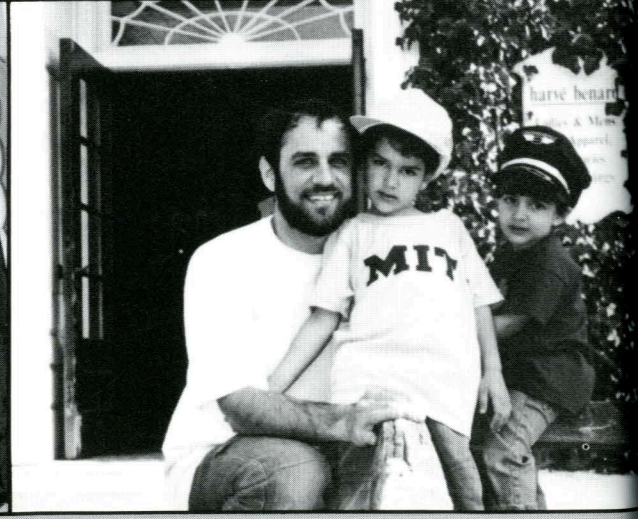
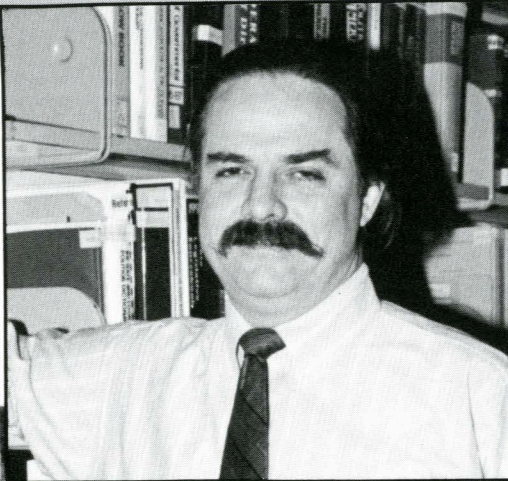

To The Class of 1991

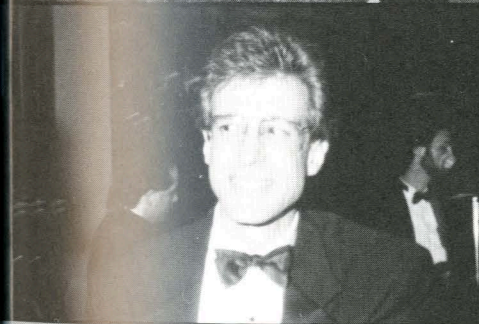
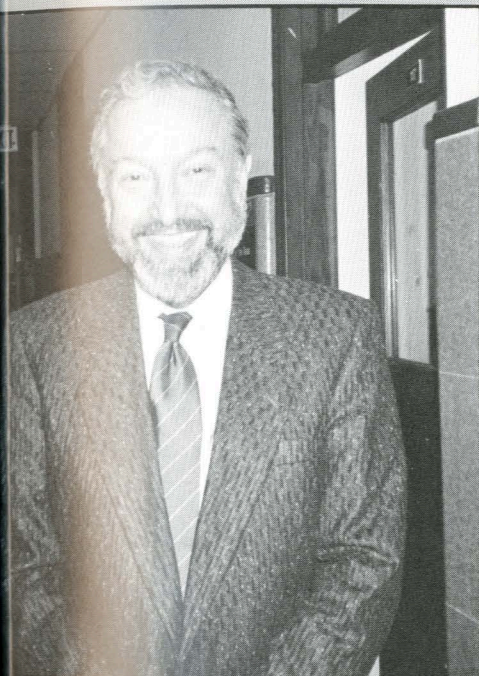

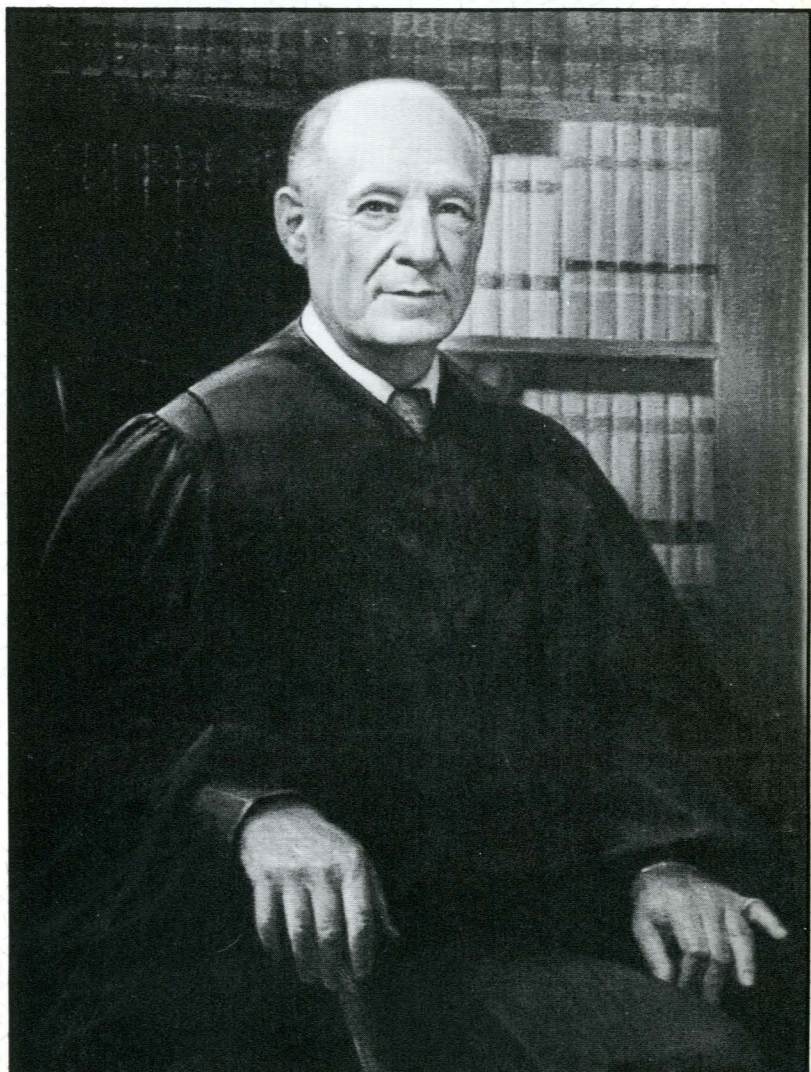
Bernard Lander has served as President of Touro College for over 20 years. He has also been distinguished as an academic administrator, sociologist and clergyman.

Library

The Law Library occupies the entire east wing of the Law School building. The facilities include a main reading room, two floors containing numerous conference and quiet study rooms, lounges, and a multimedia center. Since its arrival in Huntington in 1982, the Library has received extraordinary institutional and alumni support. The Law Library's collection has tripled in size and presently contains more than 226,000 volumes and equivalents. The Library subscribes to over 1,100 law and law related journals and newsletters.

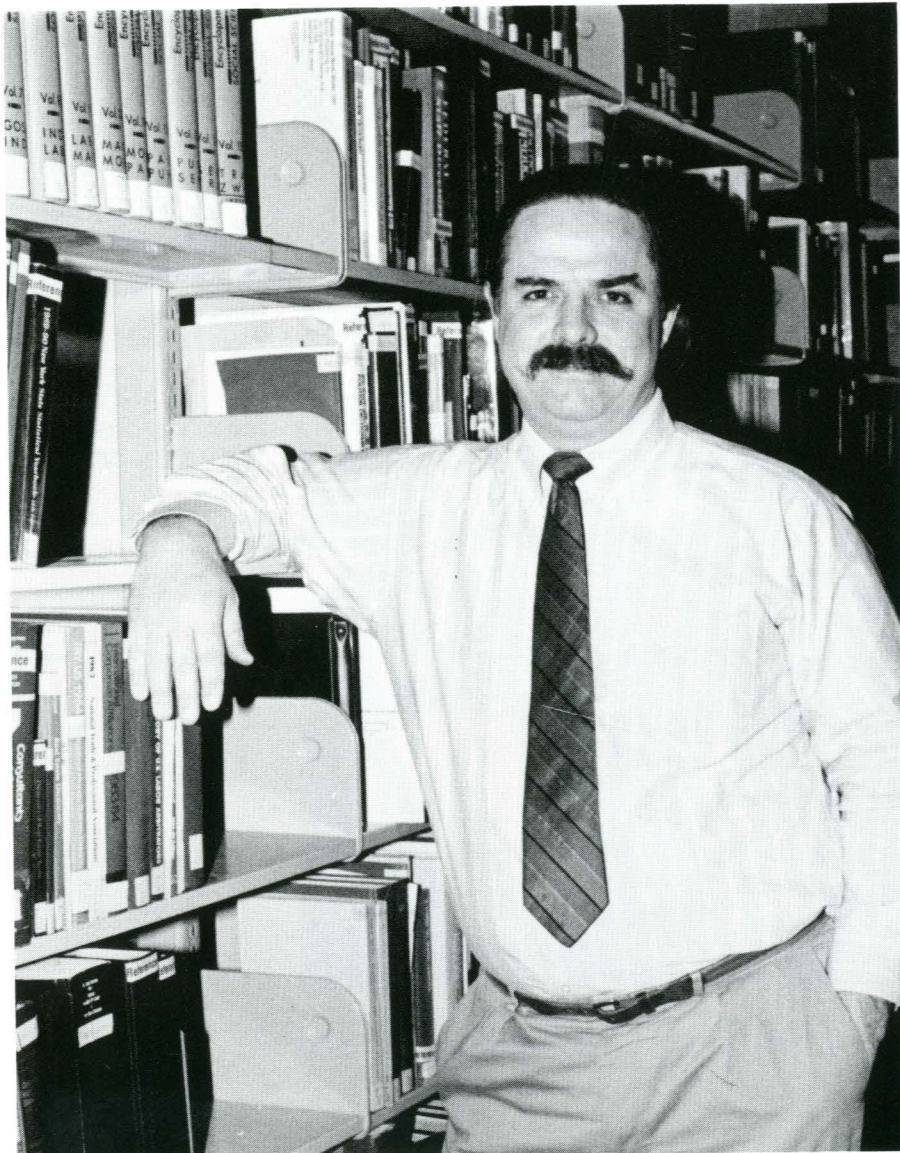
Emphasis has been placed on the expansion of student study areas as well as expanded access to LEXIS and

WESTLAW. Special attention is being given to developing the Foreign and International collections. Video and Audio services and computer applications are being included in all development plans. These dramatic improvements and additions benefit, not only library patrons, but academic student organizations, such as the Law Review, Moot Court Board, Suffolk Academy of Law Journal and Transnational Law Journal. A public WESTLAW terminal is now accessible to alumni and local attorneys.

At all times, the Librarians and Support Staff strive to offer a high level of service and assistance to every patron.

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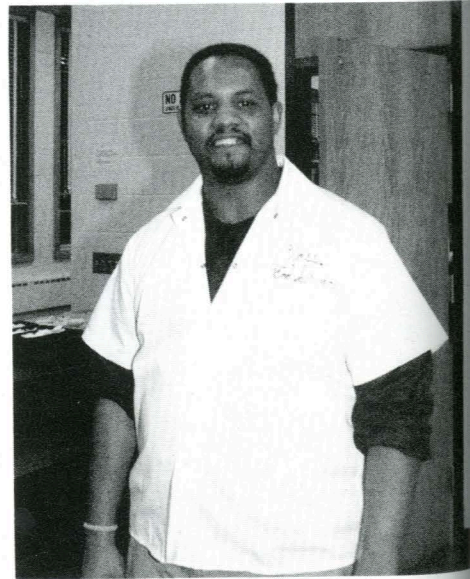
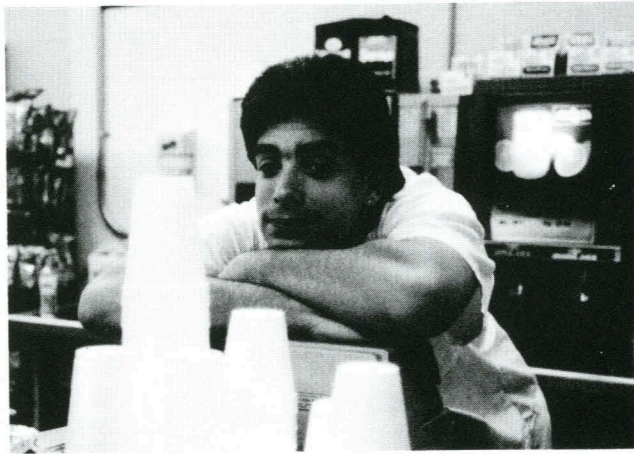

A legion of clipboard-toting counters sought out shelters, subways and steam grates on March (1990) in the broadest attempt ever to find out the extent of homelessness since it became a national disgrace in the 1980's.

Some homeless didn't mind the government intrusion. "It shows that they're starting to recognize us as humans and not the scum of the earth," said one young man of the streets.

Another homeless man said, "What are they going to use the numbers for anyway? To tell us there ain't no homeless problem? I'm a living example that there is a problem. We need jobs, not surveys."

The U.S. Census Bureau is spending \$2.7 million to tally homeless Americans, but critics fear an undercount will allow the government to justify cuts in services.

The homeless—now estimated to number 250,000 to 3 million—were asked their name, age, sex, race and marital status.

As Washington, D.C.'s deputy mayor for economic development said, the count is important because "only when we know how many homeless there are can improvements be made in the delivery of services."

Massive crowds turned out for African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela at every stop on his six-week tour of three continents. Mandela visited 14 nations in Europe, North America and Africa, achieving his goals: urging foreign governments to maintain sanctions against South Africa, raising funds for the ANC and explaining the goals of his movement.

The ANC says it aims to create a non-racial democracy and to distribute the nation's wealth more equally. Mandela, the ANC's deputy president, has said he favors a mixed economy.

Nelson Mandela, one of the world's most celebrated political prisoners, was freed by the South African government in February after 27 years in prison. He was serving a life sentence for allegedly plotting sabotage to overthrow the white government.

As of mid-October (1990), more than 200,000 U.S. troops had been deployed to Saudi Arabia, Pentagon sources said. They are preparing to defend the desert kingdom from a possible Iraqi attack.

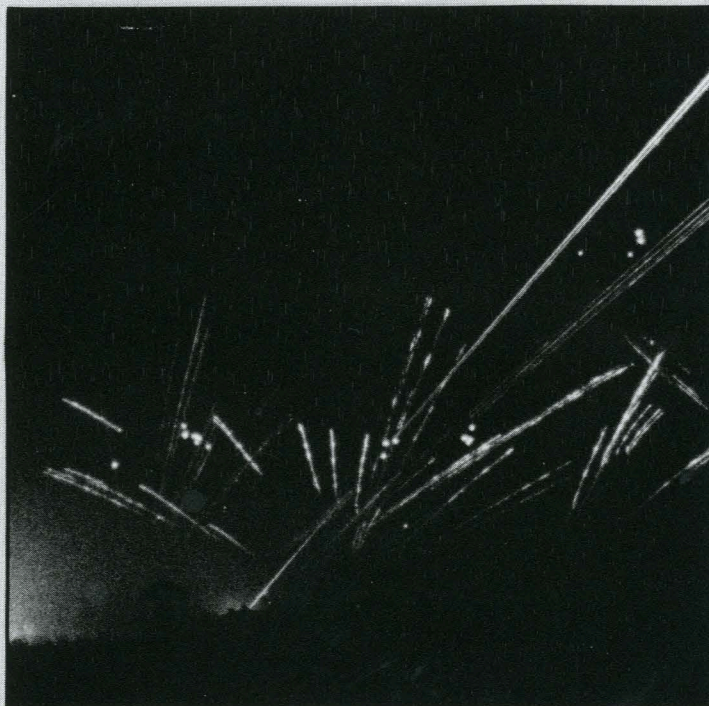
Iraq has about 430,000 men in Kuwait and southern Iraq, according to the Pentagon.

Among the latest forces to arrive in Saudi Arabia are elements of the 1st Cavalry Division, which includes a brigade of the 2nd Armored Division, from Fort Hood, TX. The soldiers are being flown on commercial jetliners, meeting up with their roughly 300 M1-Abrams tanks and other equipment which was shipped from their bases several weeks prior.

The U.S. Army's heaviest ground firepower reached Saudi soil in August for deployment behind Arab forces manning the front line in the standoff with Iraq.

Dozens of tanks and M2 Bradley armored infantry fighting vehicles, and scores more heavy support vehicles, rolled off two huge transport ships at a port in Northeastern Saudi Arabia and made their way north into the desert.

"There's no doubt in my mind that we'll succeed here if we have to," said Col. Barry Willey. "Bring them (the Iraqis) on," said a U.S. sergeant. "We have the training and technology; they've got the numbers. We'll take them out."



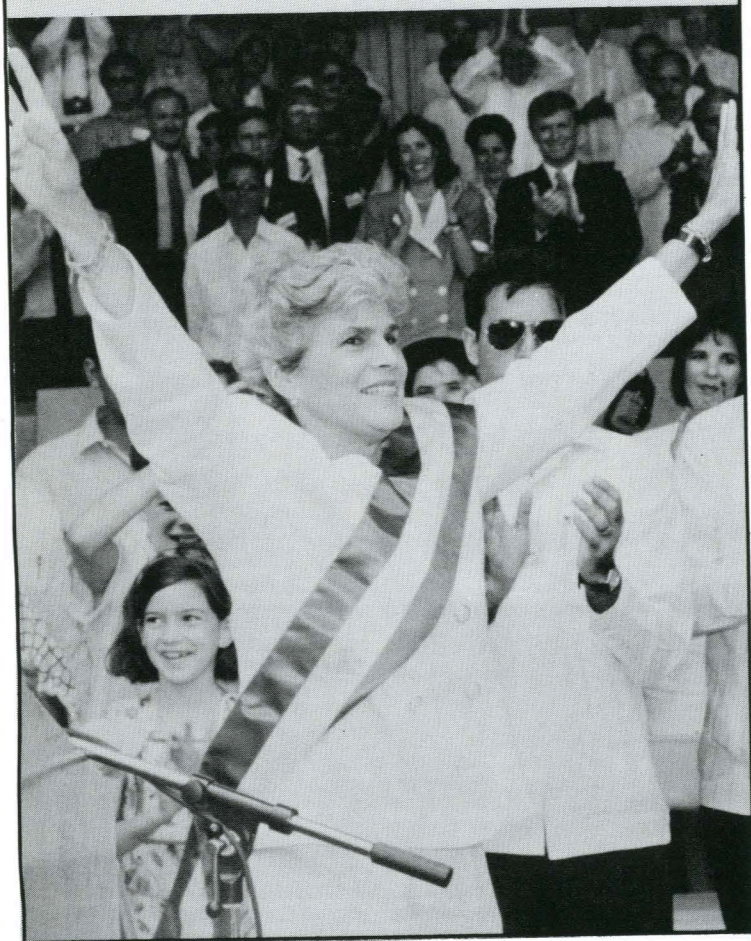

Violeta Barrios de Chamorro, publisher of Nicaragua's opposition newspaper, led a 14-part coalition to victory over Sandinista rule despite political inexperience.

"The Nicaraguan people have shown that they want to live in democracy, in peace and in freedom," Mrs. Chamorro told more than 1,000 cheering supporters at her election headquarters on February 26, 1990.

The general election was monitored by more than 3,000 international observers, including the United Nations, the Organization of American States and a delegation led by former U.S. President Jimmy Carter. They all pronounced the voting free and fair and the count clean.



A major earthquake jolted Manila and surrounding Luzon island on July 16, killing at least 193 people and leaving hundreds more trapped in collapsed buildings.

Most of the victims in Baguio, about 50, were at the Hyatt Hotel. The entire front section of the Hyatt, the city's plush hotel collapsed.

It appeared that floors containing guest rooms had crashed down onto the lobby, which includes the main restaurant, bar and shops.

Aftershocks continued the following day, forcing many residents to sleep on the streets after the quake, which measured 7.7 on the Richter scale.

A 7.8 quake struck the Philippines in 1976, killing 8,000 people. Most died in a tidal wave that struck Mindanao.

On April 22, an estimated 200 million people all over the planet celebrated the 20th anniversary of Earth Day as activists pleaded for the rise of a new "conservation generation" to care for the fragile environment.

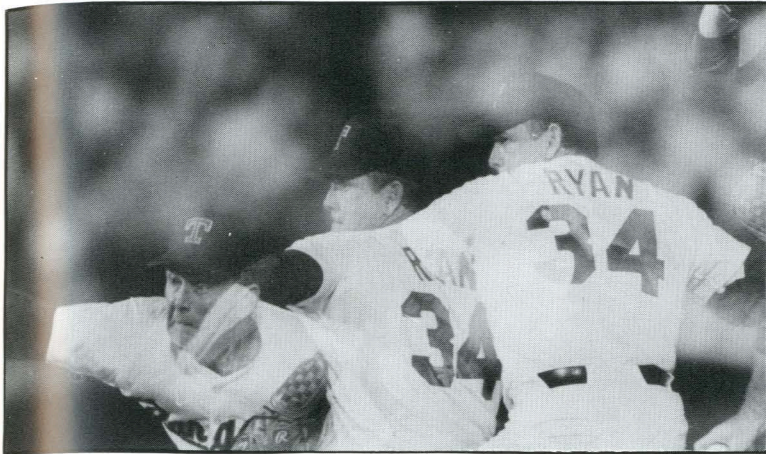
In Washington, Earth Day founder Gaylord Nelson urged more than 100,000 people massed at the foot of the Capitol to work to motivate politicians and corporate leaders to environmental action.

"I don't want to come back here 20 years from now and have to tell your sons and daughters that you didn't do your duty," said Nelson, 74, who originated Earth Day when he was a Senator from Wisconsin. "We've got to raise a conservation generation."

Earth day was celebrated in more than 3,600 U.S. communities and in 140 other nations, according to organizers.

Defeating the Milwaukee Brewers on July 31, Texas Rangers pitcher Nolan Ryan won his 300th game. "I feel more relieved than anything else after all the buildup," Ryan said after joining the 300 Club.

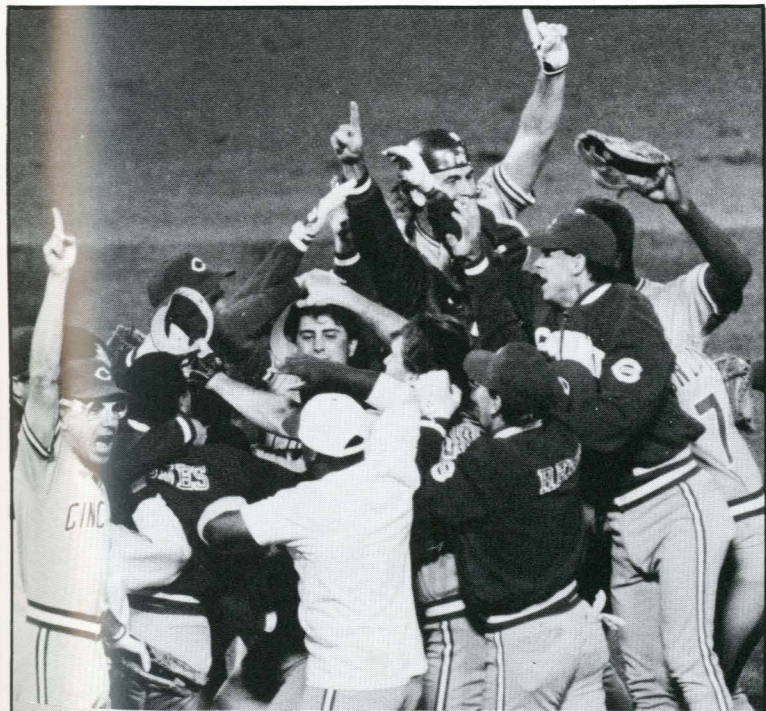
A crowd of 51,533 showed up to cheer Ryan on at County Stadium. "A lot of people have come in for this game. It's inconvenient for them, but they're friends of mine and they want to be a part of it," he said before the game.

Ryan has become one of ten major league pitchers to win 300 games.

David H. Souter, a mild-mannered, well-read and previously little-known judge from New Hampshire, became history's 105th Supreme Court justice in October (1990) after pledging to "do equal right to the poor and to the rich."

In a brief ceremony in the crowded courtroom, Souter, 51, was administered the judicial oath of office by Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist and almost immediately got to work hearing high court arguments with his eight new colleagues.

Souter joins the court at a pivotal time in its history.



The Cincinnati Reds, given no chance to beat the Oakland Athletics, needed only four quick games to win the World Series in one of the biggest upsets in baseball history.

The Athletics' third straight trip to the World Series ended with yet another disappointment. In 1988, they lost to Los Angeles, last year's championship overshadowed by an earthquake and this season, the Reds.

The Southern U.S. spent much of the Spring wringing itself out after weeks of flooding turned entire towns into muddy lakes where buildings poked up like knotty tree stumps, and the toll of shattered lives was tremendous.

In Texas alone, agricultural damage was estimated at \$700 million and at least \$60 million to residences.

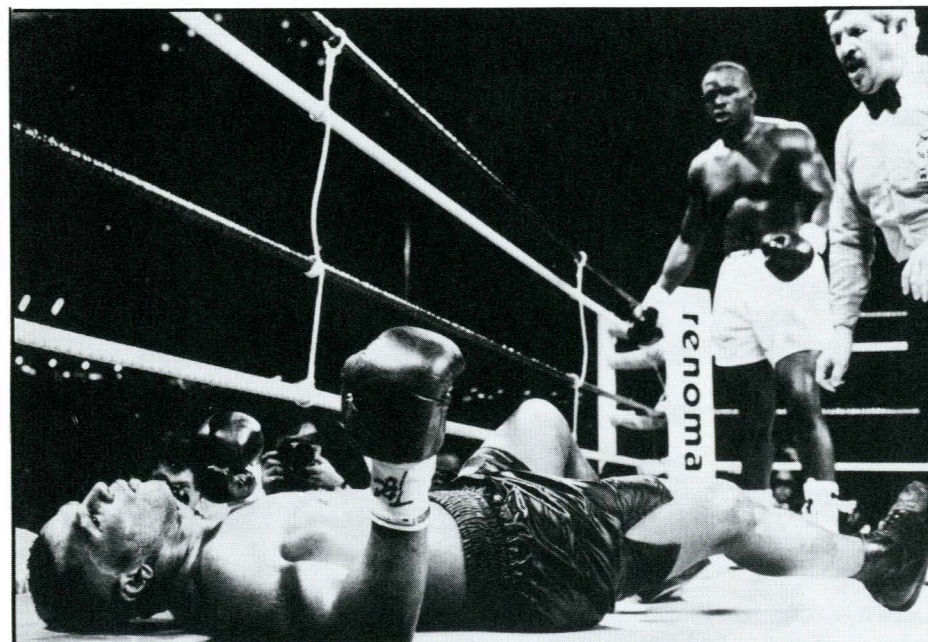


Celebrating the fruits of their summit diplomacy, President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev shook hands and signed a sheaf of agreements, including a conditional trade accord. During the June (1990) summit, the leaders also embraced a preliminary deal to cut long-range nuclear arms.

The centerpiece arms agreement, banning chemical arms production, was a foregone conclusion. But last-hour negotiating was necessary to settle differences on a framework for strategic arms cuts and a five-year grain deal.

The two leaders also agreed to strive for an elusive agreement on reduction of troops, tanks and other conventional weapons in Europe.

From twin lecterns, the two presidents spoke of what they had done and what they hope to do. "I think what is happening now...represents an event of momentous importance, not only for our two countries but for the world," said Gorbachev.



James "Buster" Douglas wore a world heavyweight championship belt after his stunning knockout of Mike Tyson in Tokyo earlier this year. At 1:23 of the 10th round, Douglas knocked Tyson out with a five-punch combination.

"He pulled the greatest upset in history," said Douglas' father. "Just call it a victory for the small man," Tyson said.



The U.S. Senate rejected a constitutional amendment against flag burning on June 26 with critics arguing that it was already dead and being debated largely as ammunition for use against them at election time.

The Senate voted 58-42 in favor, leaving it nine short of the required two thirds majority needed to approve amendments.

President Bush called for approval of the measure, which said simply that "Congress and the states shall have power to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the United States."

But the House rejected it with Democratic leaders saying that it amounted to placing limits on freedom of speech. And Speaker Thomas Foley said lawmakers would not get a chance to reconsider this year.

World leaders welcomed a united Germany into the international community on October 3 (1990), but concerns about the balance of power tempered some European enthusiasm.

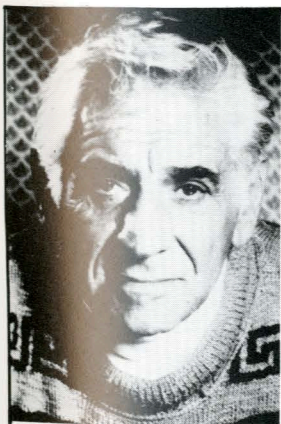
"A new era is beginning for Germany, for Europe and indeed, we hope, for the world," secretary of State James A. Baker III declared in New York.

In a message to governments worldwide, Chancellor Helmut Kohl pledged that Germany would never again pose the territorial claims that marked Germany from its initial unification in 1871 to its defeat and division in world War II. "In the future, only peace will emanate from German soil," Kohl said.

His message came after Germany held a nightlong nationwide celebration with fireworks and music.

The nation united at the stroke of midnight when a giant German flag was raised in front of the battle-scarred Reichstag building in Berlin. Kohl and other leaders joined in singing the national anthem.

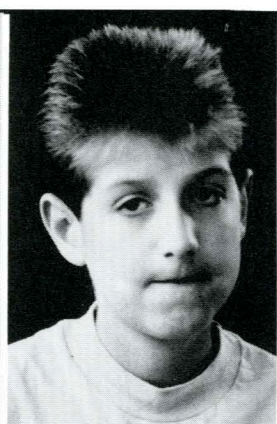
The unification came 11 months after the Berlin Wall fell in a peaceful revolt that cast aside Communist East German overlords.

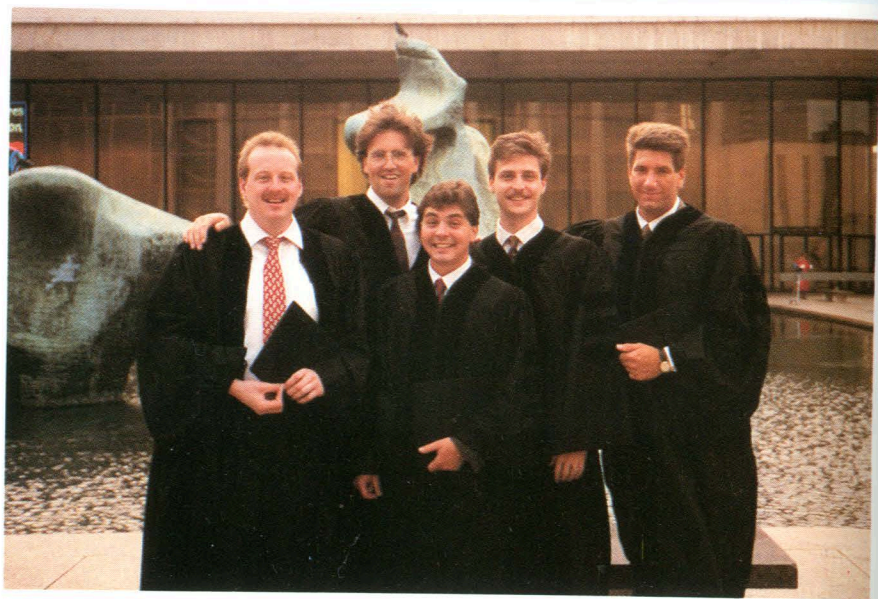


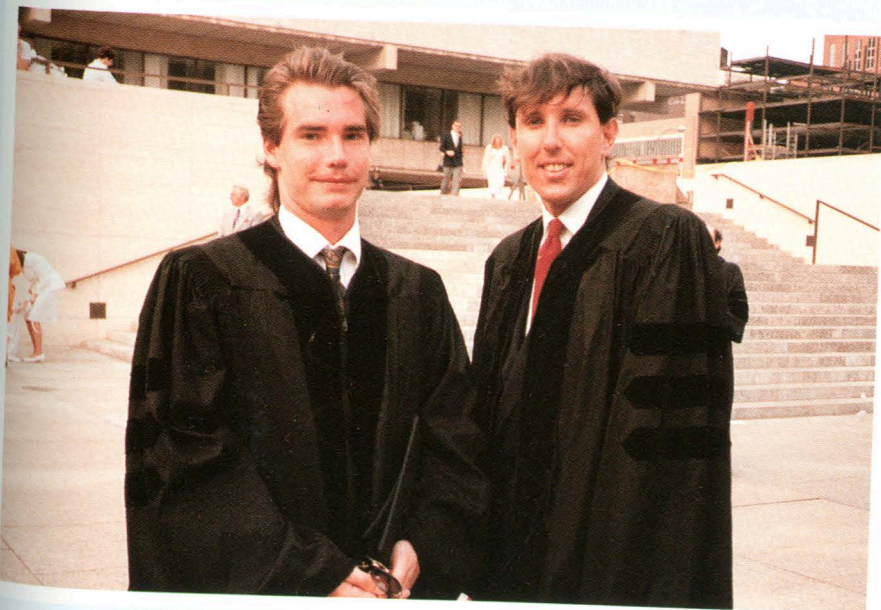
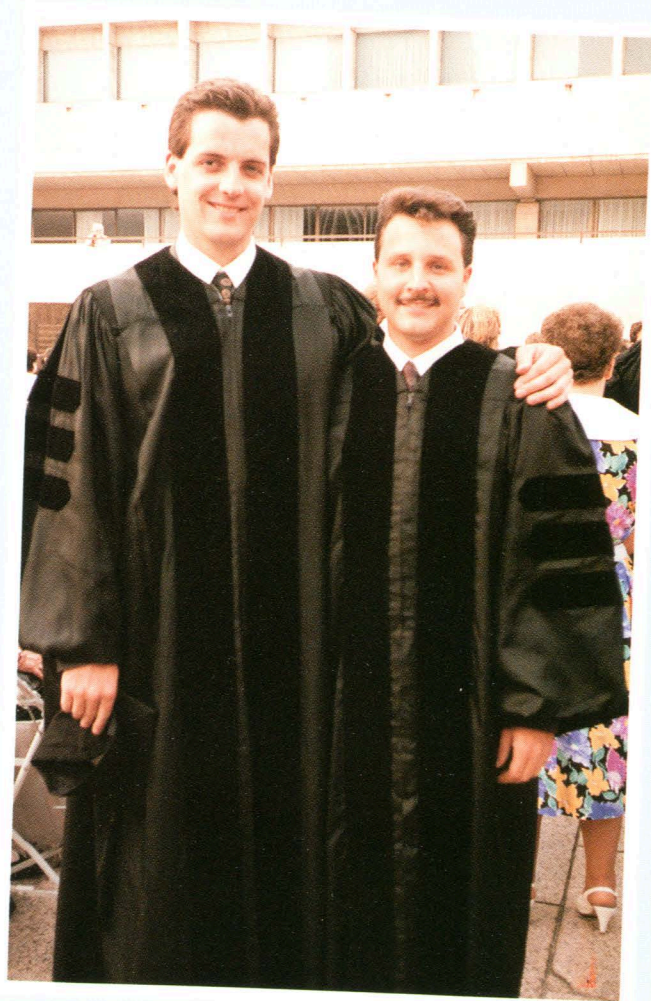
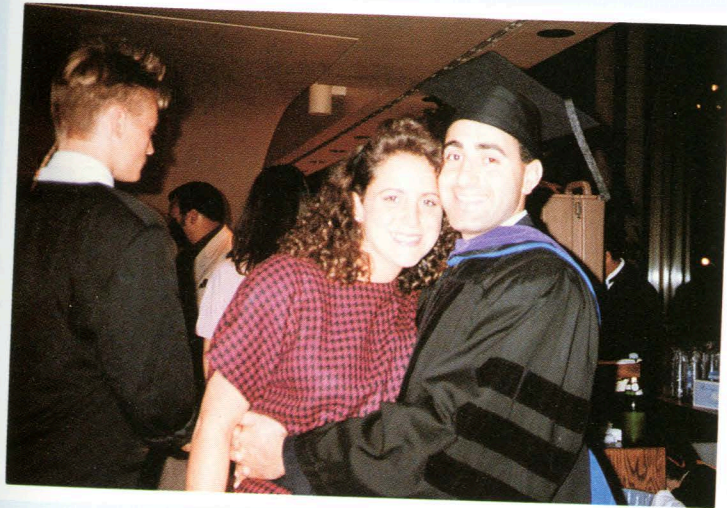
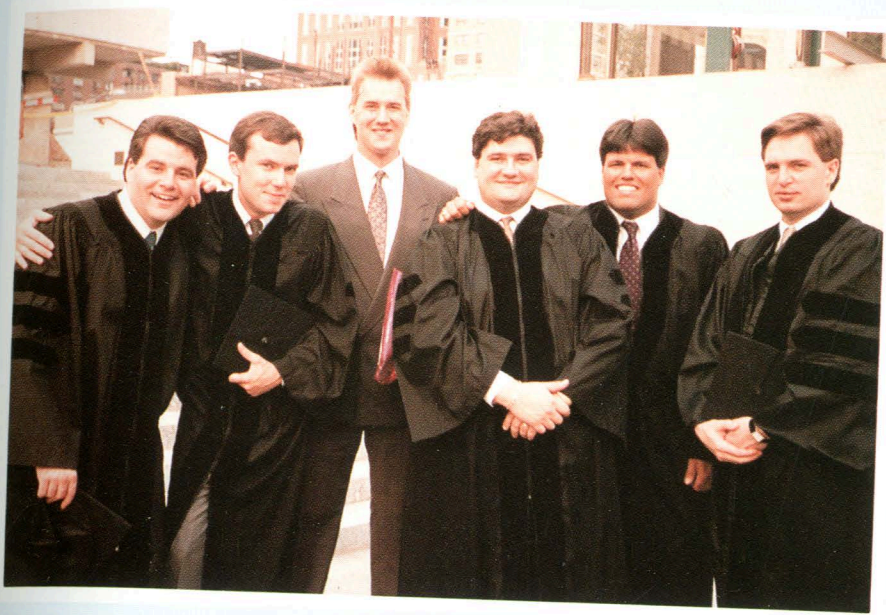


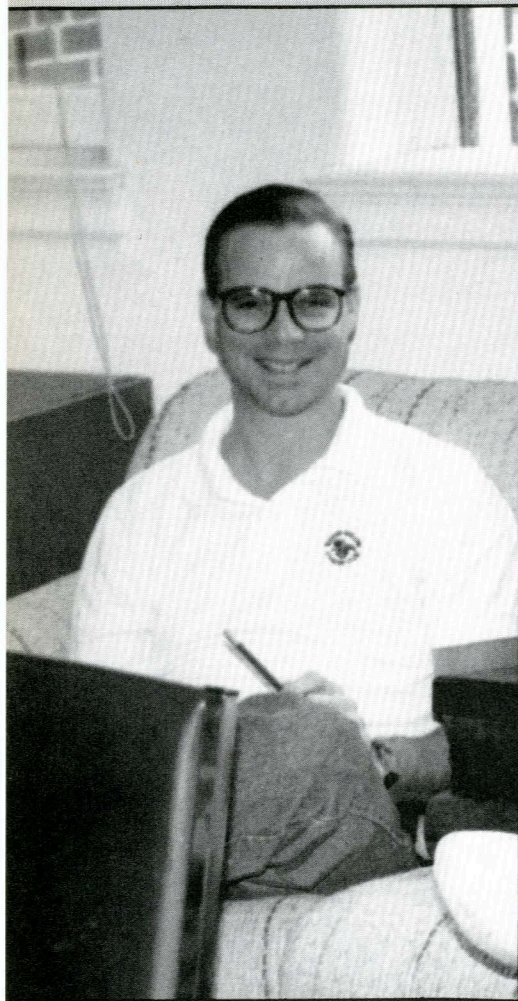




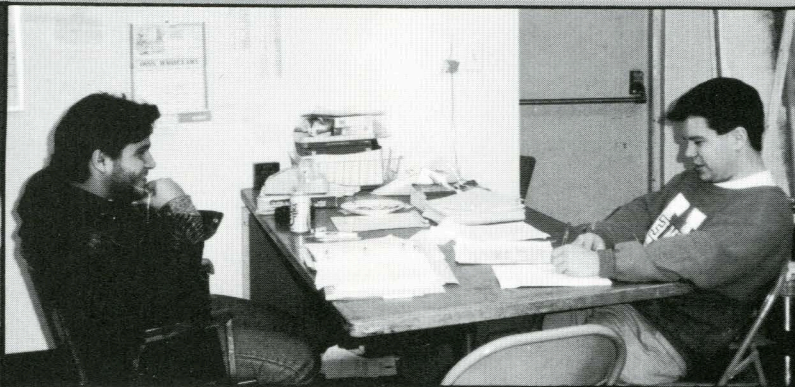








ORGANIZATIONS



Law Review

The Law Review is a compilation of scholarly articles, notes, and comments about major topical issues of the law. Law Review articles are exhaustively researched and annotated and are designed to be cited and used as references by practicing lawyers and by judges. Although articles are usually written by professors of law or other distinguished authorities, all editing is done by student members of Law Review. In addition, these students write all of the comments, notes and some of the book reviews which are published.

Appointment to the Law Review is a significant

academic achievement. Invitation to join the staff of the Review is usually offered after a student has completed 27 credits and is based upon the student's class rank and a writing competition administered by the Review.

Law Review editorship is a unique experience, the rewards of which continue long after formal law school ends. It provides the opportunity to edit manuscripts as well as the chance to discuss issues, influence the thinking of recognized authorities, and develop writing and editing skills. Skills developed by participation in Law Review are traditionally valued by the bench and bar.





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MOOT COURT

The Touro Moot Court Board is an academic honor society dedicated to excellence in Appellate Advocacy. Members are selected on the basis of their academic achievements and their proficiency at oral and written advocacy. 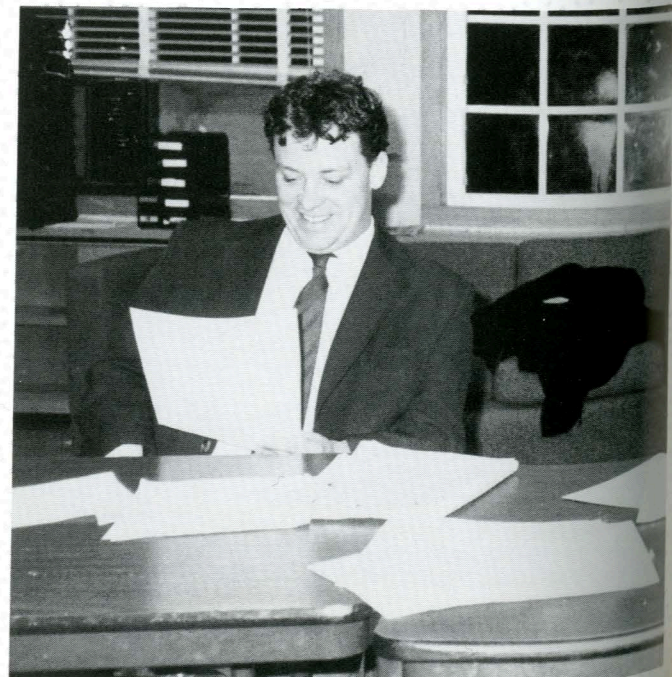
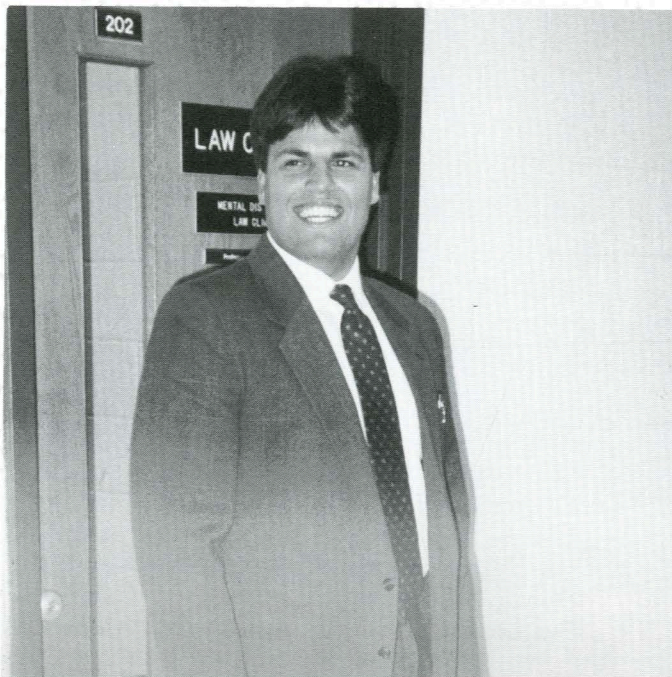

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Journal of Transnational Law

The *Journal of Transnational Law* is a scholarly publication that addresses issues, trends, and developments transcending national boundaries. *Journal* staff edit the professional articles as well as student-submitted notes of comments.

The *Journal* is one of few publications which uniquely provides a forum for dialogue among legal scholars, practitioners, and students pertaining to the multidisciplinary subject area of transnational law. Past articles have had a global perspective and have focused on such diverse subjects as the extradition of prisoner and global responses to terrorism to international products liability law and the rights and consequences of AIDS afflicted persons crossing nation-state lines.

The *Journal* staff is selected based upon a combination of grades as well as the completion of a rigorous writing competition which tests the applicants research, writing, and editorial skills. Incoming editorial board members are chosen in the second semester of the second year by the outgoing board. Such appointment is based on the quality of work contributed to the *Journal* as a staff member.

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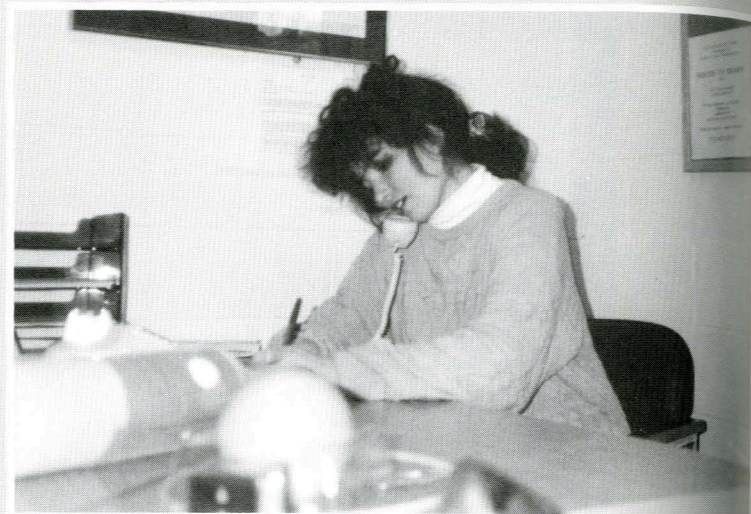

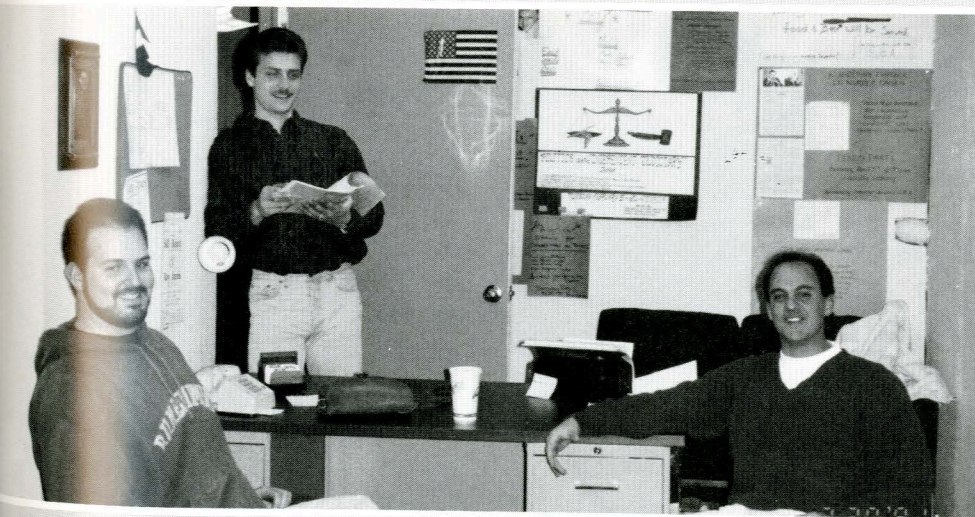

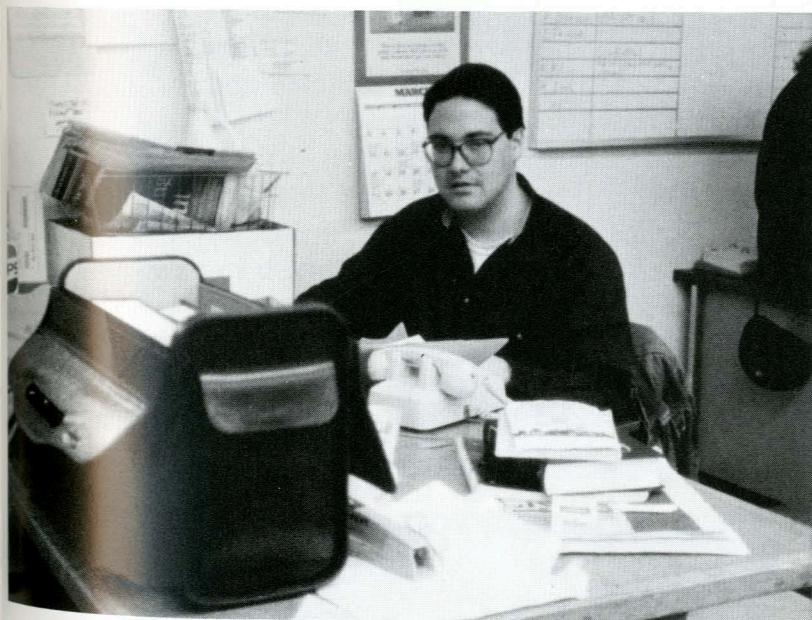

Touro's official student newspaper, *The Restatement*, is an important instrument of communication within the Law Center. All members of the Touro community are invited to write for *The Restatement*. *The Restatement* provides students with an opportunity to use their newly acquired legal skills by writing on legal topics of their own choosing. *The Restatement* also provides a forum for the consideration of matters affecting the Law Center community.

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THE HEALTH AND LAW SOCIETY

The concerns of law and health are indivisibly intertwined. Because of the critical impact of health related issues on all of our lives and its decisive function in society, the founders of the Health and Law Society believe we, as lawyers, have a special responsibility. Lawyers with an appreciation of health law concerns are in a better position to promote a harmonious relationship in areas where the concerns of health and law are mutually interdependent.

The Law Center's receptiveness to the changing needs of the students and society assisted and encouraged the development of the Society in 1989, which rapidly grew into a dynamic organization. Our rapid growth and the interest we have generated confirms the critical importance of our work. In only our second year of existence, our achievements were recognized by the Law Center which awarded the Society with the honor of "Organization of the Year."

The members of the Society have a variety of interests and experiences including; physicians, registered nurses, chiropractors, mental health professionals, hospital administrators to mention a few. The Society intends to educate students and the community of the importance of health law; identify avenues which will promote learning experiences; generate possible solutions or assistance for these issues. Health law includes: malpractice,

the right to die and the right to refuse treatment; reproductive transplantation; rights of the mentally ill; the AIDS crisis; access to health care; and the patient's rights and responsibilities.

The Health and Law Society has invited several distinguished speakers to the Law Center, to lecture on health law issues affecting society at the present time. In the fall of 1990, the Society coordinated and sponsored the first annual Health Law Symposium which was entitled, "Pregnant Drug Addicts . . . Their Children's Future in our Society . . . The Impact on Nassau and Suffolk Counties" which included thirteen distinguished panelists from the medical and legal professions. The symposium's purpose was to promote healthy pregnancies at the least cost to the individual woman, her fetus, and society by utilizing an interdisciplinary approach to discuss the various aspects of this issue. In addition to lectures and major health law events, the Society hosted a "MASH 4077" Party, in honor of our troops in the Gulf War. With the help and generosity of the Law Center community, we collected donations and sent care packages to our troops in the Gulf.

The Society began publishing a monthly NEWSLETTER in August of 1990, which serves as an avenue to inform students, faculty and the administration of the health law issues affecting society, and of the Health and Law Society's activities.

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Black Law Students Association

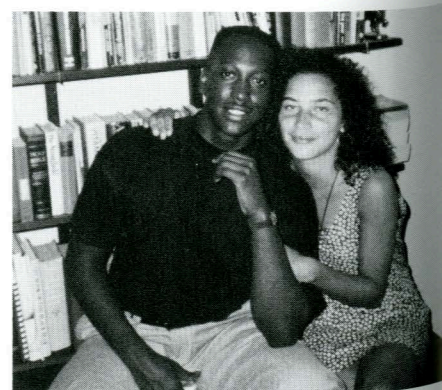

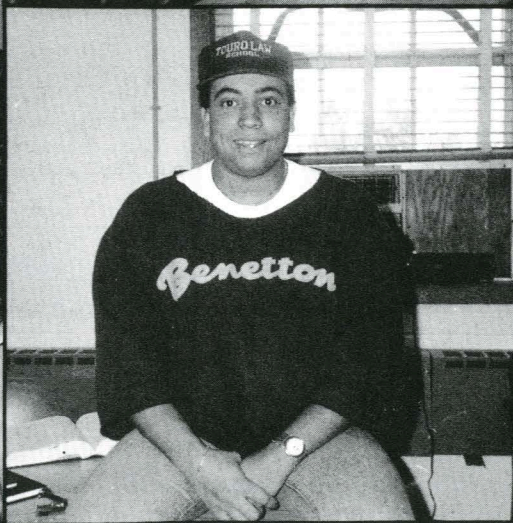
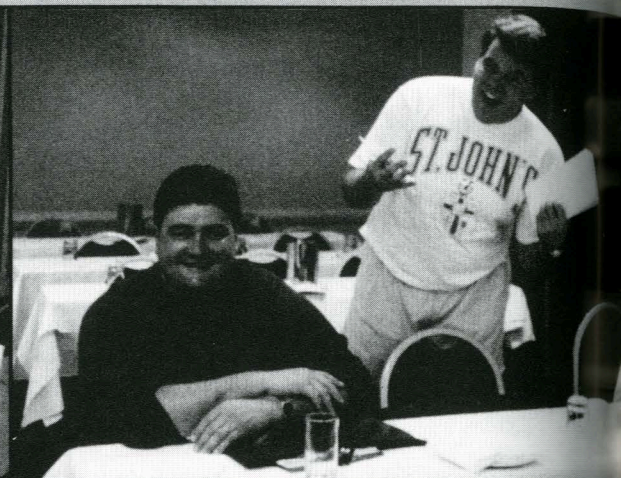

year, the President may establish ad hoc committees to address special problems and issues which may arise.

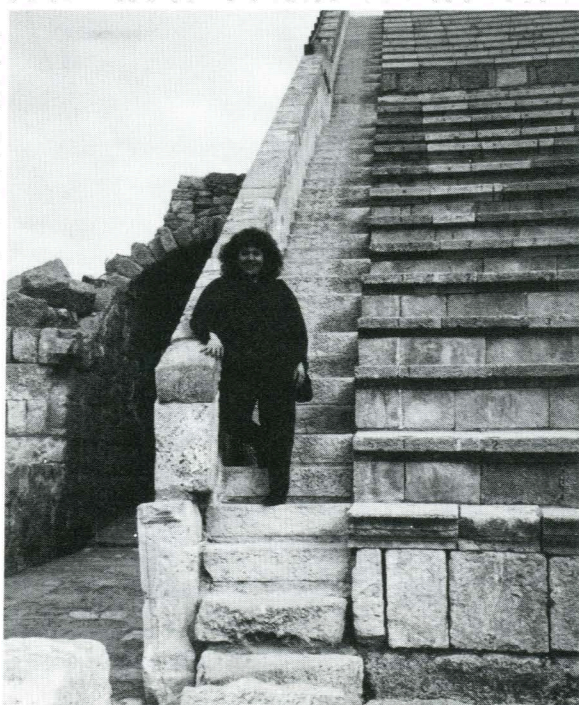


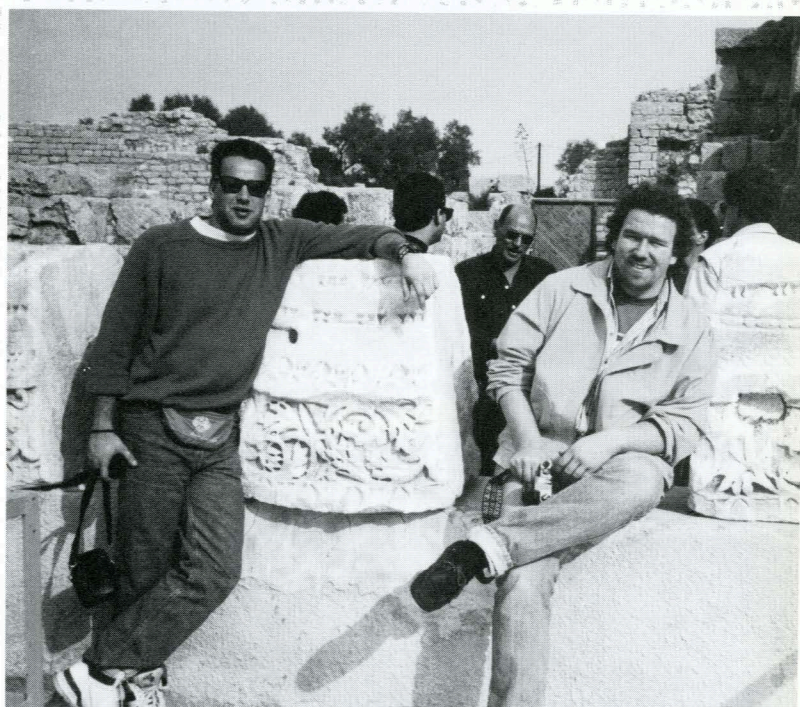
The Touro-Bar Ilan Connection

Distinguished Public Interest Lawyer in Residence Program Professor Athrur Kinoy

Arthur Kinoy is Distinguished Professor of Law at the Rutgers University School of Law. He teaches Constitutional Law, the Law of the First Amendment, and the Law of Civil Rights.

Professor Kinoy is the quintessential "people's lawyer", having devoted a lifetime as an advocate for individuals and causes involved in the central legal and political issues of our time, invariably on behalf of those who could not otherwise obtain adequate legal representation.

In the 1950's, after a stint as an attorney for the United Electrical Workers Union, he went into private practice, where he devoted most of his time and talents to representing victims of Senator Joe McCarthy and the House Un-American Activities Committee.

In the 1960's, he turned his attention to the civil rights crusade in the South, representing the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party, the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). He successfully litigated the landmark case of *Dombrowski v. Pfister*, in which the Supreme Court extended federal protections of the First Amendment rights of civil rights workers.

In the 1970's, Professor Kinoy was chief counsel for the Chicago 7 in their successful appeal of their convictions for violating the Federal Anti-Riot Statute at the 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago. He also successfully argued *United States v. United States Dis-*

trict Court, in which the Supreme Court rejected the Nixon Administration's claim that it had the right to engage in warrantless wiretapping of domestic political groups, and *Powell v. McCormick*, in which the Supreme Court held unconstitutional the exclusion of Rep. Adam Clayton Powell from the House of Representatives.

Professor Kinoy graduated from Harvard College (magna cum laude) and Columbia Law School (with honors). He is the author of "Rights on Trial, the Odyssey of a People's Lawyer". He is also a co-founder, and the current vice-president, of the Center for Constitutional Rights, one of the country's most important public interest law centers.

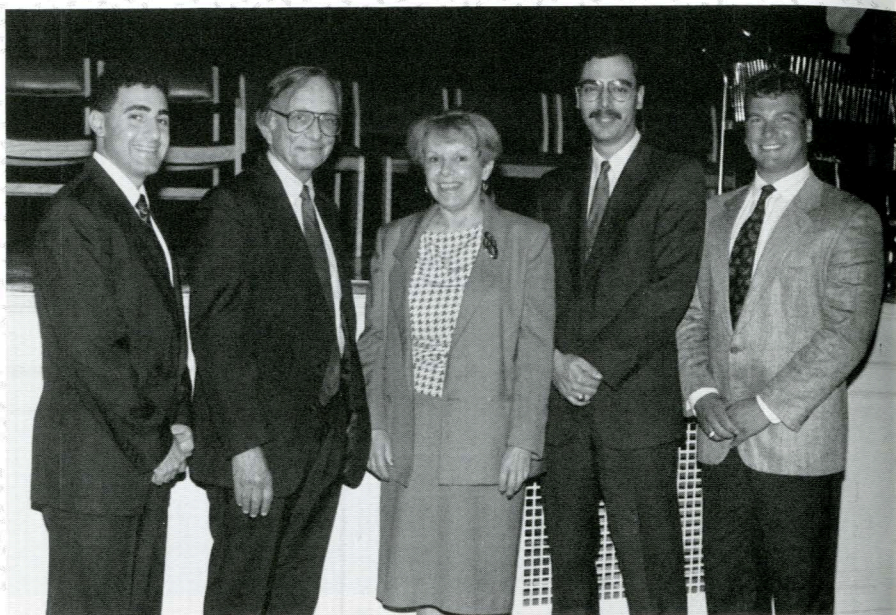


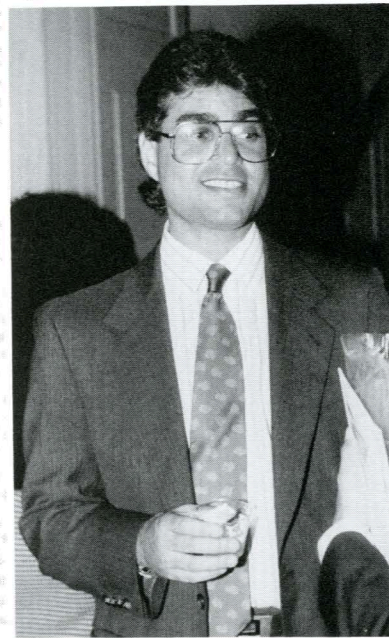
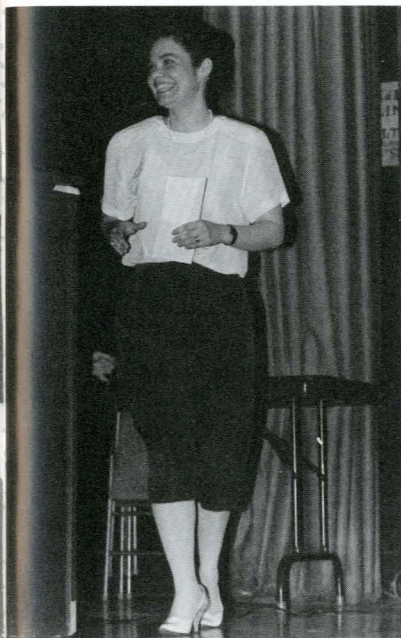
